The Committee on Government Administration and Elections reported through SEN. FONFARA of the 1st Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the bill ought to pass.

AN ACT CONCERNING GOVERNMENT ADMINISTRATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (*Effective from passage*) The joint standing committee of the
2 General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to
3 government administration shall conduct a study of government
4 administration statutes and, not later than January 1, 2003, shall submit
5 a report to the General Assembly on its findings and
6 recommendations.

This act shall take effect as follows:

Section 1	<i>from passage</i>

Explanation

The bill requires Government Administration and Elections Committee to conduct a study of government administration statuses. As members of the General Assembly are involved, the Joint Committee on Legislative Management may incur a minimal cost. A total cost of less than \$2,000 may result from mileage reimbursement to legislators in traveling to and from study meetings. Legislators are currently reimbursed 36 1/2 cents per mile. Considering that legislators may be traveling to the Capitol on other legislative business, any additional cost due to an increased number of reimbursed trips could be handled within the anticipated budgetary resources of the department.

In addition, as a result of the increased responsibilities to the legislative administrative staff assigned to this study, a reallocation of workload may result, which can be absorbed within existing appropriations.
