AN ACT CONCERNING PRISON OVERCROWDING.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. Section 54-124a of the general statutes, as amended by
2 section 161 of public act 03-6 of the June 30 special session, is repealed
3 and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2004*):

4 (a) There shall be a Board of [~~Parole~~] Pardons and Paroles within the
5 Department of Correction. [~~which~~] On and after October 1, 2004, the
6 board shall consist of [~~fifteen~~] thirteen members [, including a
7 chairman and two vice-chairmen who shall be] appointed by the
8 Governor with the advice and consent of either house of the General
9 Assembly. [~~The chairman and vice-chairmen shall be qualified by~~
10 ~~training, experience or education in law, criminal justice, parole~~
11 ~~matters or other related fields for the consideration of the matters~~
12 ~~before them and the other members shall be qualified by training and~~
13 ~~experience for the consideration of matters before them.] In the
14 appointment of the members, the Governor shall endeavor to reflect
15 the racial diversity of the state. The Governor shall appoint a
16 chairperson from among the membership. The chairperson of the
17 board shall be qualified by education, experience and training in the
18 administration of community corrections, parole or pardons.~~

19 (b) The term of each appointed member of the board serving on
20 September 30, 2004, shall expire on said date. The term of [the

21 chairman and the term of each vice-chairman] each member of the
22 board beginning on or after October 1, 2004, shall be coterminous with
23 the term of the Governor or until a successor is chosen, whichever is
24 later. [The terms of all members, except the chairman, shall expire on
25 July 1, 1994, and on or after July 1, 1994, members shall be appointed in
26 accordance with subsection (a) of this section as follows: Six members
27 shall be appointed for a term of two years; and six members shall be
28 appointed for a term of four years. Thereafter, all members shall serve
29 for terms of four years.] Any vacancy in the membership of the board
30 shall be filled for the unexpired portion of the term by the Governor.

31 (c) The [chairman] chairperson shall devote full time to the
32 performance of the duties [hereunder] under this section and shall be
33 compensated therefor in such amount as the Commissioner of
34 Administrative Services determines, subject to the provisions of section
35 4-40. The other members of said board shall receive one hundred ten
36 dollars for each day spent in the performance of their duties and shall
37 be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred in the performance of
38 such duties. The [chairman or, in his] chairperson or, in the
39 chairperson's absence or inability to act, a member designated by [him]
40 the chairperson to serve temporarily as [chairman] chairperson, shall
41 be present at all meetings of said board and participate in all decisions
42 thereof.

43 (d) The [Commissioner of Correction] chairperson shall be the
44 executive and administrative head of said board and shall have the
45 authority and responsibility for (1) [directing and supervising]
46 overseeing all administrative affairs of the board, [(2) preparing the
47 budget and annual operation plan in consultation with the board, (3)
48 assigning staff to parole panels, regions and supervision offices, (4)
49 organizing parole hearing calendars to facilitate the timely and
50 efficient processing of cases, (5) implementing a uniform case filing
51 and processing system, (6) establishing policy] (2) adopting policies in
52 all areas of [parole] pardons and paroles including, but not limited to,
53 granting pardons, commutations of punishments or releases,
54 conditioned or absolute, in the case of any person convicted of any

55 offense against the state and commutations from the penalty of death,
56 risk-based structured decision making [,] and release criteria, [and
57 supervision standards, (7) establishing specialized parole units as
58 deemed necessary, (8) entering into contracts, in consultation with the
59 board, with service providers, community programs and consultants
60 for the proper function of parole and community supervision, (9)
61 creating programs for staff and board member development, training
62 and education, (10) establishing, developing and maintaining
63 noninstitutional, community-based service programs, and (11)] (3)
64 consulting with the Department of Correction on shared issues
65 including, but not limited to, prison overcrowding, (4) consulting with
66 the Judicial Department on shared issues of community supervision,
67 and (5) signing and issuing subpoenas to compel the attendance and
68 testimony of witnesses at parole proceedings. Any such subpoena shall
69 be enforceable to the same extent as subpoenas issued pursuant to
70 section 52-143, as amended.

71 (e) The [chairman] chairperson may serve on both pardons panels
72 and parole release panels and shall have the authority and
73 responsibility for assigning members to such panels. [, each to] The
74 chairperson shall assign seven members exclusively to parole release
75 hearings and shall assign five members exclusively to pardons
76 hearings. Except for the chairperson, no member assigned to parole
77 release hearings may be assigned subsequently to pardons hearings
78 and no member assigned to pardons hearings may be assigned
79 subsequently to parole release hearings. Each parole release panel shall
80 be composed of two members and the [chairman] chairperson or a
81 member designated to serve temporarily as [chairman] chairperson,
82 for each correctional institution. Such parole release panels shall be the
83 paroling authority for the institutions to which they are assigned and
84 not less than two members shall be present at each parole hearing.
85 Each pardons panel shall be composed of three members, one of whom
86 may be the chairperson, except that for hearings on commutations
87 from the penalty of death, one member of the panel shall be the
88 chairperson.

89 (f) The chairperson, or the chairperson's designee, and two members
90 of the board shall conduct all parole release hearings and shall approve
91 or deny all parole releases recommended by an employee of the board
92 pursuant to section 54-125b, as amended by this act, and all parole
93 revocations and parole rescissions recommended by an employee of
94 the board pursuant to section 6 of this act.

95 (g) The chairperson of the board shall appoint an executive director.
96 The executive director shall oversee the administration of the agency
97 and, at the discretion of the chairperson, shall: (1) Direct and supervise
98 all administrative affairs of the board, (2) prepare the budget and
99 annual operation plan, (3) assign staff to administrative reviews, (4)
100 organize pardons and parole release hearing calendars, (5) implement
101 a uniform case filing and processing system, and (6) create programs
102 for staff and board member development, training and education.

103 (h) The chairperson, in consultation with the executive director,
104 shall adopt regulations, in accordance with chapter 54, concerning:

105 (1) Parole revocation and rescission hearings that include
106 implementing due process requirements;

107 (2) An administrative pardons process that allows an applicant
108 convicted of a crime to be granted a pardon with respect to such crime
109 without a hearing, unless a victim of such crime requests such a
110 hearing, if such applicant was:

111 (A) Convicted of a misdemeanor and (i) such conduct no longer
112 constitutes a crime, (ii) such applicant was under twenty-one years of
113 age at the time of conviction and has not been convicted of a crime
114 during the ten years preceding the date on which the pardon is
115 granted, or (iii) such conviction occurred prior to the effective date of
116 the establishment of a program under sections 17a-692 to 17a-701,
117 inclusive, as amended, section 46b-38c, as amended, 53a-39a, 53a-39c,
118 as amended, 54-56e, as amended, 54-56g, as amended, 54-56i or 54-56j
119 for which the applicant would have been eligible had such program
120 existed at the time of conviction, provided the chairperson determines

121 the applicant would likely have been granted entry into such program;
122 or

123 (B) Convicted of a violation of section 21a-277, 21a-278 or 21a-279
124 and such applicant has not been convicted of a crime during the five
125 years preceding the date on which the pardon is granted, provided
126 such date is at least five years after the date of such conviction or such
127 applicant's release from incarceration, whichever is later; and

128 (3) Requiring board members assigned to pardons hearings to issue
129 written statements containing the reasons for rejecting any application
130 for a pardon.

131 (i) The Board of Pardons and Paroles shall hold a pardons hearing at
132 least once every three months and shall hold such hearings in various
133 geographical areas of the state. The board shall not hold a pardons
134 hearing within or on the grounds of a correctional facility except when
135 solely for the benefit of applicants who are incarcerated at the time of
136 such hearing.

137 (j) The chairperson and executive director shall establish:

138 (1) In consultation with the Department of Correction, a parole
139 orientation program for all parole-eligible inmates upon their transfer
140 to the custody of the Commissioner of Correction that will provide
141 general information on the laws and policies regarding parole release,
142 calculation of time-served standards, general conditions of release,
143 supervision practices, revocation and rescission policies, and
144 procedures for administrative review and panel hearings, and any
145 other information that the board deems relevant for preparing inmates
146 for parole; and

147 (2) An incremental sanctions system for parole violations including,
148 but not limited to, reincarceration based on the type, severity and
149 frequency of the violation and specific periods of incarceration for
150 certain types of violations.

151 [(f)] (k) In the event of the temporary inability of any member other
152 than the [chairman] chairperson to perform his or her duties, the
153 Governor, at the request of the board, may appoint a qualified person
154 to serve as a temporary member during such period of inability.

155 [(g)] (l) The chairperson of the Board of [Parole] Pardons and
156 Paroles shall: (1) Adopt an annual budget and plan of operation, (2)
157 adopt such rules as deemed necessary for the internal affairs of the
158 board, (3) [develop policy for and administer the operation] adopt
159 regulations, in accordance with chapter 54, for the administration of
160 the Interstate Parole Compact, and (4) submit an annual report to the
161 Governor and General Assembly.

162 Sec. 2. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2004*) (a) The Board of Pardons and
163 Paroles shall be a successor department to the Board of Pardons and
164 the Board of Parole in accordance with the provisions of sections 4-38d
165 and 4-39 of the general statutes.

166 (b) Wherever the words "Board of Pardons" or "Board of Parole" are
167 used in the general statutes or the public acts of 2003 and 2004, the
168 words "Board of Pardons and Paroles" shall be substituted in lieu
169 thereof.

170 (c) The Legislative Commissioners' Office shall, in codifying the
171 provisions of this section, make such technical, grammatical and
172 punctuation changes as are necessary to carry out the purposes of this
173 section.

174 Sec. 3. Section 54-125a of the general statutes is repealed and the
175 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

176 (a) A person convicted of one or more crimes who is incarcerated on
177 or after October 1, 1990, who received a definite sentence or aggregate
178 sentence of more than two years, and who has been confined under
179 such sentence or sentences for not less than one-half of the aggregate
180 sentence or one-half of the most recent sentence imposed by the court,
181 whichever is greater, may be allowed to go at large on parole in the

182 discretion of the panel of the Board of Parole for the institution in
183 which the person is confined, if (1) it appears from all available
184 information, including any reports from the Commissioner of
185 Correction that the panel may require, that there is reasonable
186 probability that such inmate will live and remain at liberty without
187 violating the law, and (2) such release is not incompatible with the
188 welfare of society. At the discretion of the panel, and under the terms
189 and conditions as may be prescribed by the panel including requiring
190 the parolee to submit personal reports, the parolee shall be allowed to
191 return to the parolee's home or to reside in a residential community
192 center, or to go elsewhere. The parolee shall, while on parole, remain
193 in the legal custody and control of the board until the expiration of the
194 maximum term or terms for which the parolee was sentenced. Any
195 parolee released on the condition that the parolee reside in a
196 residential community center may be required to contribute to the cost
197 incidental to such residence. Each order of parole shall fix the limits of
198 the parolee's residence, which may be changed in the discretion of
199 such panel. Within three weeks after the commitment of each person
200 sentenced to more than one year, the state's attorney for the judicial
201 district shall send to the Board of Parole the record, if any, of such
202 person.

203 (b) (1) No person convicted of any of the following offenses, which
204 was committed on or after July 1, 1981, shall be eligible for parole
205 under subsection (a) of this section: Capital felony, as [defined]
206 provided in section 53a-54b, felony murder, as [defined] provided in
207 section 53a-54c, arson murder, as [defined] provided in section 53a-
208 54d, murder, as [defined] provided in section 53a-54a, or [any offense
209 committed with a firearm, as defined in section 53a-3, in or on, or
210 within one thousand five hundred feet of, the real property comprising
211 a public or private elementary or secondary school] aggravated sexual
212 assault in the first degree, as provided in section 53a-70a. (2) A person
213 convicted of an offense, other than an offense specified in subdivision
214 (1) of this subsection, where the underlying facts and circumstances of
215 the offense involve the use, attempted use or threatened use of

216 physical force against another person shall be ineligible for parole
217 under subsection (a) of this section until such person has served not
218 less than eighty-five per cent of the definite sentence imposed.

219 (c) The Board of Parole shall, not later than July 1, 1996, adopt
220 regulations in accordance with chapter 54 to ensure that a person
221 convicted of an offense described in subdivision (2) of subsection (b) of
222 this section is not released on parole until such person has served
223 eighty-five per cent of the definite sentence imposed by the court. Such
224 regulations shall include guidelines and procedures for classifying a
225 person as a violent offender that are not limited to a consideration of
226 the elements of the offense or offenses for which such person was
227 convicted.

228 [(d) Not later than January 15, 2002, the Board of Parole shall submit
229 a report to the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management and,
230 in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a, to the joint standing
231 committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters
232 relating to the Board of Parole, public safety and appropriations and
233 the budgets of state agencies setting forth the number of all persons
234 whose eligibility for parole release is subject to subsection (a) of this
235 section who, as of January 1, 2002, have completed seventy-five per
236 cent of their definite sentence and have not been approved for parole
237 release. Not later than February 15, 2002, and not later than the
238 fifteenth day of each month thereafter, the Board of Parole shall submit
239 a report to the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management and,
240 in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a, to the joint standing
241 committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters
242 relating to the Board of Parole, public safety and appropriations and
243 the budgets of state agencies setting forth the number of all such
244 persons who have completed seventy-five per cent of their definite
245 sentence in the preceding month and were not approved for parole
246 release.]

247 (d) The Board of Parole shall hold a hearing to determine the
248 suitability for parole release of any person whose eligibility for parole

249 release is not subject to the provisions of subsection (b) of this section
250 upon completion by such person of seventy-five per cent of such
251 person's definite or aggregate sentence.

252 (e) The Board of Parole shall hold a hearing to determine the
253 suitability for parole release of any person whose eligibility for parole
254 release is subject to the provisions of subdivision (2) of subsection (b)
255 of this section upon completion by such person of eighty-five per cent
256 of such person's definite or aggregate sentence.

257 (f) Any person released on parole under this section shall remain in
258 the custody of the Commissioner of Correction and be subject to
259 supervision by personnel of the Department of Correction during such
260 person's period of parole.

261 Sec. 4. Section 54-125b of the general statutes is repealed and the
262 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

263 (a) A person whose eligibility for parole release is not subject to the
264 provisions of subsection (b) of section 54-125a, as amended by this act,
265 may be allowed to go on parole in accordance with section 54-125a, as
266 amended by this act, or 54-125g without a parole hearing being
267 conducted by a panel of the Board of Parole if (1) an employee of the
268 Board of Parole has reviewed the inmate's case and recommended
269 parole be granted to such person, and (2) such recommendation has
270 been approved by at least two members of a panel of the board. A
271 parole hearing shall be conducted by a panel of the Board of Parole if
272 the chairperson of the board deems such a hearing to be necessary or if
273 a victim, as defined in sections 54-201, as amended, and 54-226,
274 requests such a hearing.

275 [(b) No inmate may be released pursuant to the provisions of
276 subsection (a) of this section if he or she has been convicted of a
277 violation of section 53a-55, 53a-55a, 53a-56, 53a-56a, 53a-56b, 53a-57,
278 53a-58, 53a-59, 53a-59a, 53a-70, 53a-70a, 53a-70b, 53a-92, 53a-92a, 53a-
279 134 or 53a-196a or has more than three years remaining on his or her
280 sentence.]

281 [(c)] (b) The chairperson of the Board of Parole shall adopt
282 regulations, in accordance with chapter 54, to establish criteria and
283 procedures for the administrative review and release of inmates
284 without a parole hearing as provided in this section.

285 Sec. 5. Section 54-125e of the general statutes is repealed and the
286 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

287 (a) Any person convicted of a crime committed on or after October
288 1, 1998, who received a definite sentence of more than two years
289 followed by a period of special parole shall, at the expiration of the
290 maximum term or terms of imprisonment imposed by the court, be
291 automatically transferred from the custody of the Commissioner of
292 Correction to the jurisdiction of the [chairman] chairperson of the
293 Board of Parole or, if such person has previously been released on
294 parole pursuant to subsection (a) of section 54-125a, as amended by
295 this act, or section 54-131a, remain under the jurisdiction of said
296 [chairman] chairperson until the expiration of the period of special
297 parole imposed by the court. The Department of Correction shall be
298 responsible for the supervision of any person transferred to the
299 jurisdiction of the chairperson of the Board of Parole under this section
300 during such person's period of special parole.

301 (b) Any person sentenced to a period of special parole shall be
302 subject to such rules and conditions as may be established by the
303 Board of Parole or its [chairman] chairperson pursuant to section
304 54-126.

305 (c) The period of special parole shall be not less than one year nor
306 more than ten years except that such period may be for more than ten
307 years for a person convicted of a violation of subdivision (2) of section
308 53-21 of the general statutes in effect prior to October 1, 2000,
309 subdivision (2) of subsection (a) of section 53-21, section 53a-70,
310 53a-70a, 53a-70b, 53a-71, 53a-72a or 53a-72b or sentenced as a
311 persistent dangerous felony offender pursuant to subsection (h) of
312 section 53a-40 or as a persistent serious felony offender pursuant to

313 subsection (j) of section 53a-40.

314 (d) Whenever a parolee has, in the judgment of such parolee's
315 parole officer, violated the conditions of his or her special parole, the
316 board shall cause the parolee to be brought before it without
317 unnecessary delay for a hearing on the violation charges. At such
318 hearing, the parolee shall be informed of the manner in which such
319 parolee is alleged to have violated the conditions of such parolee's
320 special parole and shall be advised by the employee of the board
321 conducting the hearing of such parolee's due process rights.

322 (e) If such violation is established, the board may: (1) Continue the
323 sentence of special parole; (2) modify or enlarge the conditions of
324 special parole; or (3) revoke the sentence of special parole.

325 (f) If the board revokes special parole for a parolee, the chairperson
326 may issue a mittimus for the commitment of such parolee to the
327 custody of the Commissioner of Correction for any period not to
328 exceed the unexpired portion of the period of special parole.

329 (g) Whenever special parole has been revoked for a parolee, the
330 board may, at any time during the unexpired portion of the period of
331 special parole, allow the parolee to be released again on special parole
332 without court order.

333 Sec. 6. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) All parole revocation and
334 rescission hearings shall be conducted by an employee of the Board of
335 Parole. The parole of a person who has been allowed to go on parole in
336 accordance with subsection (a) of section 54-125a of the general
337 statutes, as amended by this act, or section 54-125g of the general
338 statutes, who has been sentenced to a period of special parole in
339 accordance with subdivision (9) of subsection (b) of section 53a-28 of
340 the general statutes, or who has been released on parole in accordance
341 with subsection (d) or (e) of section 54-125a of the general statutes, as
342 amended by this act, shall be revoked or rescinded if, after such
343 hearing, the employee recommends such revocation or rescission and
344 such recommendation is approved by at least two members of a panel

345 of the board.

346 Sec. 7. Section 54-97 of the general statutes is repealed and the
347 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

348 No person may be committed to [the Connecticut Correctional
349 Institution, Somers,] a correctional institution or a community
350 correctional center without a mittimus signed by the judge or clerk of
351 the court which committed [him] such person or, with respect to a
352 person sentenced to a period of special parole, signed by the
353 chairperson of the Board of Parole, declaring the cause of commitment
354 and requiring the warden or Community Correctional Center
355 Administrator to receive and keep [him] such person in the
356 [Correctional Institution, Somers,] correctional institution or the
357 community correctional center, as the case may be, for the period fixed
358 by the judgment of said court or said board or until [he] such person is
359 legally discharged; and such mittimus shall be sufficient authority to
360 the officer to commit such person, and to the warden or Community
361 Correctional Center Administrator to receive and hold [him] such
362 person in custody, except that any community correctional center may
363 receive any person as provided in section 7-135 without such mittimus.

364 Sec. 8. Section 54-128 of the general statutes is repealed and the
365 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

366 (a) Any paroled [convict or] inmate who has been returned to the
367 custody of the Commissioner of Correction or any institution of the
368 Department of Correction for violation of [his] such inmate's parole
369 may be retained in [the institution from which he was paroled] a
370 correctional institution for a period equal to the unexpired portion of
371 the term of [his] such inmate's sentence at the date of the request or
372 order for [his] such inmate's return less any commutation or
373 diminution of [his] such inmate's sentence earned, except that the
374 Board of Parole may, in its discretion, determine that [he] such inmate
375 shall forfeit any or all of such earned time, or may be again paroled by
376 said board.

377 (b) Each parolee or inmate, subject to the provisions of section 18-7,
378 shall be subject to loss of all or any portion of time earned.

379 (c) Any person who, during the service of a period of special parole
380 imposed in accordance with subdivision (9) of subsection (b) of section
381 53a-28, has been returned to the custody of the Commissioner of
382 Correction or any institution of the Department of Correction for
383 violation of [his] such person's parole, may be retained in [the
384 institution from which he was paroled] a correctional institution for a
385 period equal to the unexpired portion of the period of special parole.
386 The total length of the term of incarceration and term of special parole
387 combined shall not exceed the maximum sentence of incarceration
388 authorized for the offense for which the person was convicted.

389 Sec. 9. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) Notwithstanding the provisions
390 of section 54-125a of the general statutes, as amended by this act, the
391 chairperson of the Board of Parole may transfer to any public or
392 private nonprofit halfway house, group home or mental health facility
393 or to an approved community or private residence any person
394 confined in a correctional institution or facility who has been granted
395 parole release and is within eighteen months of the parole release date
396 established by the board. Any person released from confinement
397 pursuant to this section shall be transferred from the custody of the
398 Commissioner of Correction to the jurisdiction of the chairperson of
399 the Board of Parole. The Department of Correction shall be responsible
400 for the supervision of any person transferred to the jurisdiction of the
401 chairperson of the Board of Parole under this section while such
402 person is residing at such halfway house, group home, mental health
403 facility or community or private residence. Such person may, at any
404 time, be returned to the custody of the Commissioner of Correction.

405 Sec. 10. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) Unless otherwise ordered by
406 the court, whenever an arrested person charged with the commission of
407 no crime other than a class D felony or a misdemeanor, except a violation
408 of section 53a-60a, 53a-60b, 53a-60c, 53a-60d, 53a-72a, 53a-73a or 53a-181c
409 of the general statutes, is committed by the court to the custody of the

410 Commissioner of Correction pursuant to section 54-64a of the general
411 statutes, as amended, the commissioner may release such person to a
412 residence approved by the Department of Correction subject to such
413 conditions as the commissioner may impose including, but not limited
414 to, participation in a substance abuse treatment program and being
415 subject to electronic monitoring or any other monitoring technology or
416 services. Any person released pursuant to this section shall be
417 supervised by the department and remain under the jurisdiction of the
418 commissioner during the period of such release. Upon the violation by
419 such person of any condition of such release, the commissioner may
420 revoke such release and return such person to confinement in a
421 correctional facility.

422 Sec. 11. Section 18-86b of the general statutes, as amended by section
423 156 of public act 03-6 of the June 30 special session, is repealed and the
424 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

425 (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 18-105 to 18-107,
426 inclusive, the Commissioner of Correction is authorized to improve the
427 operation of the state's correctional facilities by entering into contracts
428 with any governmental or private vendor for supervision of not more
429 than five hundred inmates outside the state. Any such governmental
430 or private vendor shall agree to be bound by the provisions of the
431 Interstate Corrections Compact, and any governmental or privately-
432 operated facility to which state inmates are transferred pursuant to a
433 contract under this subsection shall be located in a state which has
434 enacted and entered into the Interstate Corrections Compact.

435 (b) (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 18-105 to 18-107,
436 inclusive, during the fiscal years ending June 30, 2004, and June 30,
437 2005, the Commissioner of Correction is authorized to improve the
438 operation of the state's correctional facilities by entering into contracts
439 in accordance with this subsection with any governmental or private
440 vendor for the supervision of not more than an additional two
441 thousand inmates outside the state.

442 (2) If the governmental vendor with which the commissioner has a
443 contract under subsection (a) of this section on August 20, 2003, for the
444 supervision of inmates outside this state is willing to accept additional

451 additional inmates by such governmental vendor, the number of
452 inmates authorized to be supervised outside this state under
453 subdivision (1) of this subsection has not been attained, the
454 commissioner may enter into contracts with any governmental or
455 private vendor for the supervision of all or part of the remaining
456 number of inmates authorized to be supervised outside this state
457 under said subdivision (1).

458 (3) Any such governmental or private vendor shall agree to be
459 bound by the provisions of the Interstate Corrections Compact, and
460 any governmental or privately-operated facility to which state inmates
461 are transferred pursuant to a contract under this subsection shall be
462 located in a state which has enacted and entered into the Interstate
463 Corrections Compact.

464 (4) Prior to entering into any contract under this subsection, the
465 commissioner shall submit such proposed contract to the joint
466 standing committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of
467 matters relating to appropriations and the budgets of state agencies
468 and to the judiciary for their review and comment.

469 (c) A state inmate confined in any governmental or privately-
470 operated facility pursuant to the terms of any contract with the state
471 shall at all times be subject to the authority of the Commissioner of
472 Correction who may at any time remove the inmate for transfer to a
473 state correctional facility or other institution, for transfer to another
474 governmental or privately-operated facility, for release on probation or

475 parole, for discharge or for any other purpose permitted by the laws of
476 this state.

891 Department of Correction shall, not later than October 1, 2004, issue a
892 request for proposals for a Community Justice Center. Such request for
893 proposals shall require such facility to have a capacity of not less than
894 five hundred beds, be located in the city of Hartford and be operated
895 by a not-for-profit corporation that is exempt from taxation under
896 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or any
897 subsequent corresponding internal revenue code of the United States,
898 as from time to time amended, and has experience in operating such a
899 facility. Each corporation submitting a proposal in response to such
900 request for proposals must have a site acceptable for use as a
901 Community Justice Center as of the due date for the submission of
902 such proposal.

903 Sec. 28. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) (a) The Board of Parole may
904 grant a compassionate parole release to any inmate serving any

905 sentence of imprisonment, except an inmate convicted of a capital
906 felony, as defined in section 53a-54b of the general statutes, if it finds
907 that such inmate (1) is so physically or mentally debilitated,
908 incapacitated or infirm as a result of advanced age or as a result of a
909 condition, disease or syndrome that is not terminal as to be physically
910 incapable of presenting a danger to society, and (2) (A) has served not
911 less than one-half of such inmate's definite or aggregate sentence, or
912 (B) has served not less than one-half of such inmate's remaining

917 may be established by the Board of Parole and shall be supervised by
918 the Department of Correction.

919 Sec. 29. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) (a) The Departments of
920 Correction, Mental Health and Addiction Services and Social Services
921 and the Labor Department, the Board of Parole and the Judicial Branch
922 shall collaborate to develop and implement a comprehensive reentry
923 strategy that provides a continuum of custody, care and control for
924 offenders who are discharged from the custody of the Department of
925 Correction and assists in maintaining the prison population at or
926 under the authorized bed capacity. The reentry strategy shall support
927 the rights of victims, protect the public and promote the successful
928 transition of offenders from incarceration to the community.

929 (b) The success of the reentry strategy shall be measured by: (1) The
930 rates of recidivism and community revictimization, (2) the number of
931 inmates eligible for release on parole, transitional supervision,
932 probation or any other release program, (3) the number of inmates
933 who make the transition from incarceration to the community in
934 compliance with a discharge plan, (4) prison bed capacity ratios, (5) the
935 adequacy of the network of community-based treatment, vocational,
936 educational, supervision and other services and programs, and (6) the
937 reinvestment of any savings achieved through a reduction in prison

938 population into reentry and community-based services and programs.

939 (c) Not later than January 1, 2005, and annually thereafter, the
940 Department of Correction shall submit a report, in accordance with the
941 provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, on the success of the
942 reentry strategy based on the measures set forth in subsection (b) of
943 this section to the joint standing committees of the General Assembly
944 having cognizance of matters relating to corrections, public safety and
945 appropriations and the budgets of state agencies.

946 Sec. 30. Subsection (e) of section 18-100 of the general statutes is
947 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from*
948 *passage*):

949 (e) If the Commissioner of Correction deems that the purposes of
950 this section may thus be more effectively carried out, [he] the
951 commissioner may transfer any person from one correctional
952 institution to another or to any public or private nonprofit halfway
953 house, group home or mental health facility [with the concurrence of
954 the warden, superintendent or person in charge of the facility to which
955 said person is being transferred] or, after satisfactory participation in a
956 residential program, to any approved community or private residence.
957 Any inmate so transferred shall remain under the jurisdiction of said
958 commissioner.

959 Sec. 31. Section 18-101a of the general statutes is repealed and the
960 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

961 The Commissioner of Correction at [his] the commissioner's
962 discretion may extend the limits of the place of confinement of [a
963 prisoner] an inmate as to whom there is reasonable belief he or she will
964 honor his or her trust, by authorizing [him] the inmate under
965 prescribed conditions to visit a specifically designated place or places,
966 within or without the state, for periods not exceeding [fifteen] thirty
967 days and return to the same or another institution or facility. Such
968 periods may be renewed at the discretion of the commissioner. Such
969 furlough may be granted only to permit a visit to a dying relative,

970 attendance at the funeral of a relative, the obtaining of medical services
 971 not otherwise available, the contacting of prospective employers, or for
 972 any compelling reason consistent with rehabilitation. Any inmate who
 973 fails to return from furlough as provided in the furlough agreement
 974 shall be guilty of the crime of escape in the first degree.
