**"AN ACT CONCERNING SERVICE OF LIQUOR TO MINORS AND
LIQUOR SERVER TRAINING."**

1 "Sec. 501. Section 30-22 of the general statutes is repealed and the
2 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective from passage*):

3 (a) A restaurant permit shall allow the retail sale of alcoholic liquor
4 to be consumed on the premises of a restaurant. A restaurant patron
5 [may] shall be allowed to remove one unsealed bottle of wine for off-
6 premises consumption provided the patron has purchased a full
7 course meal and consumed a portion of the bottle of wine with such
8 meal on the restaurant premises. For the purposes of this section, "full
9 course meal" means a diversified selection of food which ordinarily
10 cannot be consumed without the use of tableware and which cannot be
11 conveniently consumed while standing or walking. A restaurant
12 permit, with prior approval of the Department of Consumer
13 Protection, shall allow alcoholic liquor to be served at tables in outside
14 areas which are screened or not screened from public view where
15 permitted by fire, zoning and health regulations. If not required by

16 fire, zoning or health regulations, a fence or wall enclosing such
17 outside areas shall not be required by the Department of Consumer
18 Protection. No fence or wall used to enclose such outside areas shall be
19 less than thirty inches high. The annual fee for a restaurant permit
20 shall be one thousand two hundred dollars.

21 (b) A restaurant permit for beer shall allow the retail sale of beer
22 and of cider not exceeding six per cent of alcohol by volume to be
23 consumed on the premises of a restaurant. The annual fee for a
24 restaurant permit for beer shall be two hundred forty dollars.

25 (c) A restaurant permit for wine and beer shall allow the retail sale
26 of wine and beer and of cider not exceeding six per cent of alcohol by
27 volume to be consumed on the premises of the restaurant. A restaurant
28 patron may remove one unsealed bottle of wine for off-premises
29 consumption provided the patron has purchased a full course meal
30 and consumed a portion of the bottle of wine with such meal on the
31 restaurant premises. The annual fee for a restaurant permit for wine
32 and beer shall be five hundred sixty dollars.

34 (e) A partially consumed bottle of wine that is to be removed from
35 the premises pursuant to subsection (a) or (c) of this section shall be
36 securely sealed and placed in a bag by the permittee or permittee's
37 agent or employee prior to removal from the premises.

38 (f) "Restaurant" means space, in a suitable and permanent building,
39 kept, used, maintained, advertised and held out to the public to be a
40 place where hot meals are regularly served, but which has no sleeping
41 accommodations for the public and which shall be provided with an
42 adequate and sanitary kitchen and dining room and employs at all
43 times an adequate number of employees."
