The Committee on Government Administration and Elections reported through SEN. SLOSSBERG of the 14th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the bill ought to pass.

AN ACT PROTECTING THE HOME ADDRESSES OF INSPECTORS IN THE DIVISION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. Subsection (e) of section 14-10 of the 2008 supplement to
2 the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu
3 thereof (*Effective from passage*):

4 (e) In the event (1) a federal court judge, federal court magistrate or
5 judge of the Superior Court, Appellate Court or Supreme Court of the
6 state, (2) a member of a municipal police department or a member of
7 the Division of State Police within the Department of Public Safety, (3)
8 an employee of the Department of Correction, (4) an attorney-at-law
9 who represents or has represented the state in a criminal prosecution,
10 (5) a member or employee of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, (6) a
11 judicial branch employee regularly engaged in court-ordered
12 enforcement or investigatory activities, (7) an inspector employed by
13 the Division of Criminal Justice, (8) a federal law enforcement officer

14 who works and resides in this state, or [(8)] (9) a state referee under
15 section 52-434, submits a written request and furnishes such
16 individual's business address to the commissioner, such business
17 address only shall be disclosed or available for public inspection to the
18 extent authorized by this section.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Explanation

The bill adds to the list of public officials whose home address is withheld by the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). This will have no fiscal impact on the DMV.

IN THE DIVISION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE.*****SUMMARY:**

By law, the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) can withhold from public disclosure the home addresses of certain public officials. This bill adds Division of Criminal Justice inspectors to the list of federal, state, and local employees who may ask the DMV commissioner to substitute their business addresses for their residential addresses on DMV records available for public disclosure or inspection. Like other employees seeking this protection, the inspectors must provide the DMV with their business addresses.

The Freedom of Information Act already prohibits other public agencies from disclosing the inspectors' residential addresses.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Upon passage

BACKGROUND***Employees Eligible for Residential Address Protection***

Employees eligible to have their home addresses protected on DMV documents are: judges, magistrates, police, Department of Correction employees, past or present state prosecutors, Board of Pardons and Paroles members or employees, Judicial Branch employees regularly engaged in court ordered enforcement or investigatory activities, federal law enforcement officers who live and work in Connecticut, and state referees.
