
The Connecticut State Firefighters Association would like to go on record as being in support of **House Bill #6194, 'AN ACT CONCERNING ADDITIONAL WORKERS' COMPENSATION PRESUMPTIONS FOR FIREFIGHTERS, POLICE OFFICERS AND EMERGENCY RESCUE WORKERS'.**

As Connecticut's first responders, firefighters consistently face dangerous situations where they are needed to act quickly. Firefighters act in uncontrolled environments with a high risk of on-the-job exposure to dangerous chemicals and communicable diseases. Current Connecticut laws, with their important privacy precautions, make it prohibitive for a firefighter to prove their exposure to communicable diseases while on the job, and yet the burden of proof to an exposure for Workers' Compensation claims is on the firefighter.

This legislation would establish a rebuttable presumption so that when firefighters contract work related diseases, such as certain cancers and communicable diseases such as hepatitis, meningococcal meningitis, and tuberculosis occurring while such firefighter is on duty, it is presumed that they were exposed to these diseases in the course of their employment, provided that such member completed a physical examination on entry into such employment that failed to reveal any evidence of said diseases, unless the contrary is shown by competent evidence.

Firefighters usually put their victims before themselves. Firefighters need to know that their communities support them in what they do. Firefighters protect their communities. The least their communities can do is protect their firefighters. Please support this important legislation.
