**In 1997, the legislature recognized the need for the seafood industry

preservation. First begun as the CT Seafood Task Force, eventually
becoming the CT Seafood Council by statute, the Council is working
as a voice for the industry. The Council has become widely
recognized throughout the state as a source of information for other
states, for legislators, and for the press as well. Often quoted in the

pertaining not only to our industry, but to Long Island

The Council also participates in Ag Day at the Capitol in conjunction with the Marketing Division of the Dept. of Agriculture. We publish an attractive brochure touting the superiority of our CT shellfish and finfish. We take representatives from major grocery chains on tours of our boats, docks and facilities in both the eastern and western fishing areas of our state. We also publish a newsletter for industry members and legislators with informative articles and reports.

The CT Seafood Council holds regular monthly board meetings and two annual membership meetings, one in the eastern part of the state, and one in the western portion. These provide good forums for discussions, questions and concerns.
