*TESTIMONY OF  
ATTORNEY GENERAL RICHARD BLUMENTHAL  
BEFORE THE ENERGY AND TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE  
FEBRUARY 17, 2009*

I appreciate the opportunity to support House Bill 5995, An Act Concerning the Freedom to Dry.

This proposal prohibits municipalities, condominium associations and other associations from restricting a resident's reasonable use of a clothesline or drying rack for the purposes of drying clothes.

Clothes drying has profound impacts on the environment. These appliances are the third highest consumer household electricity user -- about 8% of the total. Convenience and social pressure have combined to drive drying indoors. Over the years, community associations have banned outdoor drying. These prohibitions mean residents use more electricity, leading to more pollution and demand for fuel.

Common-sense dictates that residents should be encouraged to reduce clothes dryer machine use whenever possible. Reasonable restrictions could allow the use of such outdoor drying while addressing community standards for the neighborhood or association. Connecticut should join 10 other states -- including Florida, Hawaii, North Carolina and Utah -- with similar laws.

I urge the committee's favorable consideration of House Bill 5995.
