"AN ACT IMPLEMENTING THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PROGRAM REVIEW AND INVESTIGATIONS COMMITTEE CONCERNING THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES."

1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and substitute the
2 following in lieu thereof:

3 "Section 1. Section 17a-3 of the general statutes is repealed and the
4 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

5 (a) The department shall plan, create, develop, operate or arrange
6 for, administer and evaluate a comprehensive and integrated
7 state-wide program of services, including preventive services, for
8 children and youths whose behavior does not conform to the law or to
9 acceptable community standards, or who are mentally ill, including
10 deaf and hearing impaired children and youths who are mentally ill,
11 emotionally disturbed, substance abusers, delinquent, abused,

12 neglected or uncared for, including all children and youths who are or
13 may be committed to it by any court, and all children and youths
14 voluntarily admitted to, or remaining voluntarily under the
15 supervision of, the commissioner for services of any kind. Services
16 shall not be denied to any such child or youth solely because of other
17 complicating or multiple disabilities. The department shall work in
18 cooperation with other child-serving agencies and organizations to
19 provide or arrange for preventive programs, including, but not limited
20 to, teenage pregnancy and youth suicide prevention, for children and
21 youths and their families. The program shall provide services and
22 placements that are clinically indicated and appropriate to the needs of
23 the child or youth. In furtherance of this purpose, the department
24 shall: (1) Maintain the Connecticut Juvenile Training School and other
25 appropriate facilities exclusively for delinquents; (2) develop a
26 comprehensive program for prevention of problems of children and
27 youths and provide a flexible, innovative and effective program for the
28 placement, care and treatment of children and youths committed by
29 any court to the department, transferred to the department by other
30 departments, or voluntarily admitted to the department; (3) provide
31 appropriate services to families of children and youths as needed to
32 achieve the purposes of sections 17a-1 to 17a-26, inclusive, as amended
33 by this act, 17a-28 to 17a-49, inclusive, as amended by this act, and
34 17a-51; (4) establish incentive paid work programs for children and
35 youths under the care of the department and the rates to be paid such
36 children and youths for work done in such programs and may provide
37 allowances to children and youths in the custody of the department;
38 (5) be responsible to collect, interpret and publish statistics relating to
39 children and youths within the department; (6) conduct studies of any
40 program, service or facility developed, operated, contracted for or
41 supported by the department in order to evaluate its effectiveness; (7)
42 establish staff development and other training and educational
43 programs designed to improve the quality of departmental services
44 and programs, provided no social worker trainee shall be assigned a
45 case load prior to completing training, and may establish educational
46 or training programs for children, youths, parents or other interested

47 persons on any matter related to the promotion of the well-being of
48 children, or the prevention of mental illness, emotional disturbance,
49 delinquency and other disabilities in children and youths; (8) develop
50 and implement aftercare and follow-up services appropriate to the
51 needs of any child or youth under the care of the department; (9)
52 establish a case audit unit to monitor each area office's compliance
53 with regulations and procedures; (10) develop and maintain a database
54 listing available community service programs funded by the
55 department; (11) provide outreach and assistance to persons caring for
56 children whose parents are unable to do so by informing such persons
57 of programs and benefits for which they may be eligible; and (12)
58 collect data sufficient to identify the housing needs of children served
59 by the department and share such data with the Department of
60 Economic and Community Development.

61 [(b) The department shall prepare and submit biennially to the
62 General Assembly a five-year master plan. The master plan shall
63 include, but not be limited to: (1) The long-range goals and the current
64 level of attainment of such goals of the department; (2) a detailed
65 description of the types and amounts of services presently provided to
66 the department's clients; (3) a detailed forecast of the service needs of
67 current and projected target populations; (4) detailed cost projections
68 for alternate means of meeting projected needs; (5) funding priorities
69 for each of the five years included in the plan and specific plans
70 indicating how the funds are to be used; (6) a written plan for the
71 prevention of child abuse and neglect; (7) a comprehensive mental
72 health plan for children and adolescents, including children with
73 complicating or multiple disabilities; (8) a comprehensive plan for
74 children and youths who are substance abusers, developed in
75 conjunction with the Department of Mental Health and Addiction
76 Services pursuant to the provisions of sections 19a-2a and 19a-7; and
77 (9) an overall assessment of the adequacy of children's services in
78 Connecticut. The plan shall be prepared within existing funds
79 appropriated to the department.]

80 (b) (1) The department, with the assistance of the State Advisory

81 Council on Children and Families, and in consultation with
82 representatives of the children and families served by the department,
83 providers of services to children and families, advocates, and others
84 interested in the well-being of children and families in this state, shall
85 develop and regularly update a single, comprehensive strategic plan
86 for meeting the needs of children and families served by the
87 department. In developing and updating the strategic plan, the
88 department shall identify and define agency goals and indicators of
89 progress, including benchmarks, in achieving such goals. The strategic
90 plan shall include, but not be limited to: (A) The department's mission
91 statement; (B) the expected results for the department and each of its
92 mandated areas of responsibility; (C) a schedule of action steps and a
93 time frame for achieving such results and fulfilling the department's
94 mission that includes strategies for working with other state agencies
95 to leverage resources and coordinate service delivery; (D) priorities for
96 services and estimates of the funding and other resources necessary to
97 carry them out; (E) standards for programs and services that are based
98 on research-based best practices, when available; and (F) relevant
99 measures of performance.

100 (2) The department shall begin the strategic planning process on
101 July 1, 2009. The department shall hold regional meetings on the plan
102 to ensure public input and shall post the plan and the plan's updates
103 and progress reports on the department's web site. The department
104 shall submit the strategic plan to the State Advisory Council on
105 Children and Families for review and comment prior to its final
106 submission to the General Assembly and the Governor. On or before
107 July 1, 2010, the department shall submit the strategic plan, in
108 accordance with section 11-4a, to the General Assembly and the
109 Governor.

110 (3) The commissioner shall track and report on progress in
111 achieving the strategic plan's goals not later than October 1, 2010, and
112 quarterly thereafter, to said State Advisory Council. The commissioner
113 shall submit a status report on progress in achieving the results in the
114 strategic plan, in accordance with section 11-4a, not later than July 1,

115 2011, and annually thereafter to the General Assembly and the
116 Governor.

117 (c) The department shall prepare a plan to keep children who are
118 convicted as delinquent and will be committed to the Department of
119 Children and Families and placed in the Connecticut Juvenile Training
120 School in such facility for at least one year after their referral to the
121 department, which plan shall include provisions for development of a
122 comprehensive approach to juvenile rehabilitation.

123 Sec. 2. Subsection (b) of section 17a-6 of the general statutes is
124 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July*
125 *1, 2009*):

126 (b) Administer in a coordinated and integrated manner all
127 institutions and facilities which are or may come under the jurisdiction
128 of the department and [may] shall appoint advisory groups for any
129 such institution or facility.

130 Sec. 3. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2009*) (a) The facilities that come
131 under the jurisdiction of the Department of Children and Families, as
132 enumerated in section 17a-32 of the general statutes, shall submit an
133 annual report to the State Advisory Council on Children and Families
134 and to their respective advisory groups, established pursuant to
135 subsection (b) of section 17a-6 of the general statutes, as amended by
136 this act. The report shall include, but not be limited to: (1) Aggregate
137 profiles of the residents; (2) a description of and update on major
138 initiatives; (3) key outcome indicators and results; (4) costs associated
139 with operating the facility; and (5) a description of educational,
140 vocational and literacy programs, and behavioral, treatment and other
141 services available to the residents and their outcomes. Each report
142 submitted pursuant to this subsection shall be posted on the
143 department's web site.

144 (b) Such advisory groups shall respond to their facility's annual
145 report, submitted pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, and
146 provide any recommendations for improvement or enhancement that

147 they deem necessary.

148 (c) The Department of Children and Families shall serve as
149 administrative staff of such advisory groups.

150 Sec. 4. Section 17a-27f of the general statutes is repealed and the
151 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

152 [(a) The Department of Children and Families shall establish a
153 public safety committee in the municipality in which the Connecticut
154 Juvenile Training School is located. The committee shall be composed
155 of the superintendent of said school and representatives appointed by
156 the chief elected official of the municipality. The committee shall meet
157 not less than quarterly to review safety and security issues which affect
158 the host municipality.]

159 [(b)] At the time the Connecticut Juvenile Training School becomes
160 operational, the Department of Children and Families shall ensure that
161 a community security and alert system shall be functional.

162 Sec. 5. Section 46a-13l of the general statutes is repealed and the
163 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

164 (a) The Child Advocate shall:

165 (1) Evaluate the delivery of services to children by state agencies
166 and those entities that provide services to children through funds
167 provided by the state;

168 (2) Review periodically the procedures established by any state
169 agency providing services to children to carry out the provisions of
170 sections 46a-13k to 46a-13q, inclusive, as amended by this act, with a
171 view toward the rights of the children and recommend revisions to
172 such procedures;

173 (3) Review complaints of persons concerning the actions of any state
174 or municipal agency providing services to children and of any entity
175 that provides services to children through funds provided by the state,

176 make appropriate referrals and investigate those where the Child
177 Advocate determines that a child or family may be in need of
178 assistance from the Child Advocate or that a systemic issue in the
179 state's provision of services to children is raised by the complaint;

180 (4) Pursuant to an investigation, provide assistance to a child or
181 family who the Child Advocate determines is in need of such
182 assistance including, but not limited to, advocating with an agency,
183 provider or others on behalf of the best interests of the child;

184 (5) Periodically review the facilities and procedures of any and all
185 institutions or residences, public or private, where a juvenile has been
186 placed by any agency or department;

187 (6) Recommend changes in state policies concerning children
188 including changes in the system of providing juvenile justice, child
189 care, foster care and treatment;

190 (7) Take all possible action including, but not limited to, conducting
191 programs of public education, undertaking legislative advocacy and
192 making proposals for systemic reform and formal legal action, in order
193 to secure and ensure the legal, civil and special rights of children who
194 reside in this state;

195 (8) Provide training and technical assistance to attorneys
196 representing children and guardians ad litem appointed by the
197 Superior Court;

198 (9) Periodically review the number of special needs children in any
199 foster care or permanent care facility and recommend changes in the
200 policies and procedures for the placement of such children;

201 (10) Serve or designate a person to serve as a member of the child
202 fatality review panel established in subsection (b) of this section; and

203 (11) Take appropriate steps to advise the public of the services of the
204 Office of the Child Advocate, the purpose of the office and procedures
205 to contact the office.

206 (b) There is established a child fatality review panel composed of
207 thirteen permanent members as follows: The Child Advocate, or a
208 designee; the Commissioners of Children and Families, Public Health
209 and Public Safety, or their designees; the Chief Medical Examiner, or a
210 designee; the Chief State's Attorney, or a designee; a pediatrician,
211 appointed by the Governor; a representative of law enforcement,
212 appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate; an attorney,
213 appointed by the majority leader of the Senate; a social work
214 professional, appointed by the minority leader of the Senate; a
215 representative of a community service group appointed by the speaker
216 of the House of Representatives; a psychologist, appointed by the
217 majority leader of the House of Representatives; and an injury
218 prevention representative, appointed by the minority leader of the
219 House of Representatives. A majority of the panel may select not more
220 than three additional temporary members with particular expertise or
221 interest to serve on the panel. Such temporary members shall have the
222 same duties and powers as the permanent members of the panel. The
223 chairperson shall be elected from among the panel's permanent
224 members. The panel shall, to the greatest extent possible, reflect the
225 ethnic, cultural and geographic diversity of the state.

226 (c) The panel shall review the circumstances of the death of a child
227 placed in out-of-home care or whose death was due to unexpected or
228 unexplained causes to facilitate development of prevention strategies
229 to address identified trends and patterns of risk and to improve
230 coordination of services for children and families in the state. Members
231 of the panel shall not be compensated for their services, but may be
232 reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred in the performance of
233 their duties.

234 (d) On or before January 1, 2000, and annually thereafter, the panel
235 shall issue an annual report which shall include its findings and
236 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on its
237 review of child fatalities for the preceding year.

238 (e) Upon request of two-thirds of the members of the panel and

239 within available appropriations, the Governor, the General Assembly
240 or at the Child Advocate's discretion, the Child Advocate shall conduct
241 an in-depth investigation and review and issue a report with
242 recommendations on the death or critical incident of a child. The
243 report shall be submitted to the Governor, the General Assembly and
244 the commissioner of any state agency cited in the report and shall be
245 made available to the general public.

246 (f) Any state agency cited in a report issued by the Office of the
247 Child Advocate, pursuant to the Child Advocate's responsibilities
248 under this section, shall submit a written response to the report and
249 recommendations made in the report to the Governor and the General
250 Assembly not later than ninety days after receipt of such report and
251 recommendations. The General Assembly shall submit a copy of such
252 response to the Office of the Child Advocate immediately upon
253 receipt.

254 ~~[(f)]~~ (g) The Chief Medical Examiner shall provide timely notice to
255 the Child Advocate and to the chairperson of the child fatality review
256 panel of the death of any child that is to be investigated pursuant to
257 section 19a-406.

258 ~~[(g)]~~ (h) Any agency having responsibility for the custody or care of
259 children shall provide timely notice to the Child Advocate and the
260 chairperson of the child fatality review panel of the death of a child or
261 a critical incident involving a child in its custody or care.

262 Sec. 6. Section 17a-4 of the general statutes is repealed and the
263 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

264 (a) There shall be a State Advisory Council on Children and
265 Families which shall consist of seventeen members appointed by the
266 Governor, including at least five persons who are child care
267 professionals, two persons eighteen to twenty-five years of age,
268 inclusive, served by the Department of Children and Families, one
269 child psychiatrist licensed to practice medicine in this state and at least
270 one attorney who has expertise in legal issues related to children and

271 youth. The balance of the advisory council shall be representative of
272 young persons, parents and others interested in the delivery of services
273 to children and youths, including child protection, behavioral health,
274 juvenile justice and prevention services. No less than fifty per cent of
275 the council's members shall be parents or family members of children
276 who have received, or are receiving, behavioral health services, child
277 welfare services or juvenile services and no more than half the
278 members of the council shall be persons who receive income from a
279 private practice or any public or private agency that delivers mental
280 health, substance abuse, child abuse prevention and treatment, child
281 welfare services or juvenile services. Members of the council shall
282 serve without compensation, except for necessary expenses incurred in
283 the performance of their duties. The Department of Children and
284 Families shall provide the council with funding to facilitate the
285 participation of those members representing families and youth, as
286 well as for other administrative support services. Members shall serve
287 on the council for terms of two years each and no member shall serve
288 for more than two consecutive terms. The commissioner shall be an ex-
289 officio member of the council without vote and shall attend its
290 meetings. Any member who fails to attend three consecutive meetings
291 or fifty per cent of all meetings during any calendar year shall be
292 deemed to have resigned. The council shall elect a chairperson and
293 vice-chairperson to act in the chairperson's absence.

294 (b) The council shall meet quarterly, and more often upon the call of
295 the chair or a majority of the members. The council's meetings shall be
296 held at locations that facilitate participation by members of the public,
297 and its agenda and minutes shall be posted on the department's web
298 site. A majority of the members in office, but not less than six
299 members, shall constitute a quorum. The council shall have complete
300 access to all records of the institutions and facilities of the department
301 in furtherance of its duties, while at all times protecting the right of
302 privacy of all individuals involved, as provided in section 17a-28.

303 (c) The duties of the council shall be to: (1) Recommend to the
304 commissioner programs, legislation or other matters which will

305 improve services for children and youths, including behavioral health
306 services; (2) annually review and advise the commissioner regarding
307 the proposed budget; (3) interpret to the community at large the
308 policies, duties and programs of the department; [and] (4) issue any
309 reports it deems necessary to the Governor and the Commissioner of
310 Children and Families; (5) assist in the development of and review and
311 comment on the strategic plan developed by the department pursuant
312 to subsection (b) of section 17a-3, as amended by this act; (6) receive on
313 a quarterly basis from the commissioner a status report on the
314 department's progress in carrying out the strategic plan; (7)
315 independently monitor the department's progress in achieving its
316 goals as expressed in the strategic plan; and (8) offer assistance and
317 provide an outside perspective to the department so that it may be able
318 to achieve the goals expressed in the strategic plan.

319 Sec. 7. Subsection (a) of section 17a-22b of the general statutes is
320 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July*
321 *1, 2009*):

322 (a) Each community collaborative shall, within available
323 appropriations, (1) complete a local needs assessment which shall
324 include objectives and performance measures, (2) specify the number
325 of children and youths requiring behavioral health services, and (3)
326 specify the number of children and youths actually receiving
327 community-based and residential services and the type and frequency
328 of such services. [, and (4) complete an annual self-evaluation process
329 and a review of discharge summaries.] Each community collaborative
330 shall submit its local needs assessment to the Commissioner of
331 Children and Families and the Commissioner of Social Services.

332 Sec. 8. Section 17a-145 of the general statutes is repealed and the
333 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

334 No person or entity shall care for or board a child without a license
335 obtained from the Commissioner of Children and Families, except: (1)
336 When a child has been placed by a person or entity holding a license

337 from the commissioner; (2) any residential educational institution
338 exempted by the state Board of Education under the provisions of
339 section 17a-152; (3) residential facilities licensed by the Department of
340 Developmental Services pursuant to section 17a-227; (4) facilities
341 providing child day care services, as defined in section 19a-77; or (5)
342 any home that houses students participating in a program described in
343 subparagraph (B) of subdivision (8) of section 10a-29. The person or
344 entity seeking a child-care facility license shall file with the
345 commissioner an application for a license, in such form as the
346 commissioner furnishes, stating the location where it is proposed to
347 care for such child, the number of children to be cared for, in the case
348 of a corporation, the purpose of the corporation and the names of its
349 chief officers and of the actual person responsible for the child. The
350 Commissioner of Children and Families is authorized to fix the
351 maximum number of children to be boarded and cared for in any such
352 home or institution or by any person or entity licensed by the
353 commissioner. [Each person or entity holding a license under the
354 provisions of this section shall file annually, with the commissioner, a
355 report stating the number of children received and removed during
356 the year, the number of deaths and the causes of death, the average
357 cost of support per capita and such other data as the commissioner
358 may prescribe.] If the population served at any facility, institution or
359 home operated by any person or entity licensed under this section
360 changes after such license is issued, such person or entity shall file a
361 new license application with the commissioner, and the commissioner
362 shall notify the chief executive officer of the municipality in which the
363 facility is located of such new license application, except that no
364 confidential client information may be disclosed.

365 Sec. 9. Section 17a-37 of the general statutes is repealed and the
366 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

367 (a) The Commissioner of Children and Families shall establish a
368 school district within the Department of Children and Families, for the
369 education or assistance of any child or youth who resides in or receives
370 day treatment at any state-operated institution or facility within that

371 department and whose needs require that his education be provided
372 within the institution in which he resides or at which he receives day
373 treatment. The school district shall be known as State of Connecticut-
374 Unified School District #2. The Commissioner of Children and
375 Families shall administer, coordinate and control the operations of the
376 school district and shall be responsible for the overall supervision and
377 direction of all courses and activities of the school district and shall
378 establish such vocational and academic education, research and
379 statistics, training and development services and programs as he
380 considers necessary or advisable in the best interests of the persons
381 benefiting therefrom. The commissioner or his designee shall be the
382 superintendent of said district and shall act in accordance with the
383 applicable provisions of section 10-157.

384 (b) The superintendent of the school district shall have the power to
385 (1) establish and maintain within the Department of Children and
386 Families such schools of different grades as he may from time to time
387 require and deem necessary; (2) establish and maintain within the
388 department such school libraries as may from time to time be required
389 in connection with the educational courses, services and programs
390 authorized by this section; (3) purchase, receive, hold and convey
391 personal property for school purposes and equip and supply such
392 schools with necessary furniture and other appendages; (4) make
393 agreements and regulations for the establishing and conducting of the
394 district's schools and employ and dismiss, in accordance with the
395 applicable provisions of section 10-151, such teachers as are necessary
396 to carry out the intent of this section and to pay their salaries; (5)
397 receive any federal funds or aid made available to the state for such
398 programs and shall be eligible for and may receive any other funds or
399 aid whether private, state or otherwise, to be used for the purposes of
400 this section.

401 (c) The superintendent of the school district may cooperate with the
402 federal government in carrying out the purposes of any federal law
403 pertaining to the education of students within his school district, and
404 may adopt such methods of administration as are found by the federal

405 government to be necessary, and may comply with such conditions as
406 may be necessary to secure the full benefit of all such federal funds
407 available.

408 [(d) The Commissioner of Children and Families shall annually
409 evaluate the progress and accomplishments of the school district
410 established in accordance with subsection (a) of this section. Said
411 commissioner shall submit annual evaluation reports to the
412 Commissioner of Education in order to apprise the State Board of
413 Education of the true condition, progress and needs of said school
414 district. Said commissioner shall follow procedures adopted by the
415 Commissioner of Education in preparation of annual evaluation
416 reports.]

417 Sec. 10. Section 17a-22c of the general statutes is repealed and the
418 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2009*):

419 (a) The Commissioner of Children and Families and the
420 Commissioner of Social Services shall establish performance measures
421 in the areas of finance, administration, utilization, client satisfaction,
422 quality and access for Connecticut Community KidCare.

423 (b) The Commissioner of Children and Families shall develop and
424 implement, within available appropriations, culturally appropriate
425 and competency-based curricula including best practices for the care of
426 children and youths with, or at risk of, behavioral health needs and
427 offer training to all willing persons involved in Connecticut
428 Community KidCare, including, but not limited to, employees in
429 education and child care and appropriate employees within the
430 judicial system.

431 [(c) The Commissioners of Children and Families and Social
432 Services shall, within available appropriations, design and conduct a
433 five-year independent longitudinal evaluation with evaluation goals
434 and methods utilizing an independent evaluator. The evaluation shall
435 assess changes in outcomes for individual children, youths and
436 families, evaluate the effectiveness of the overall initiative in the early

437 phases to guide future expansion of Connecticut Community KidCare
438 and examine benefits, costs and cost avoidance achieved by it. Such
439 evaluation may include, but is not limited to, the following: (1)
440 Utilization of out-of-home placements; (2) adherence to system of care
441 principles; (3) school attendance; (4) delinquency recidivism rates; (5)
442 satisfaction of families and children and youths with Connecticut
443 Community KidCare as assessed through client satisfaction surveys;
444 (6) coordination of Connecticut Community KidCare with the juvenile
445 justice, child protection, adult behavioral health and education
446 systems; and (7) the quality of transition services.]

447 Sec. 11. (NEW) (*Effective July 1, 2009*) The Department of Children
448 and Families shall collect and analyze data to determine the percentage
449 of the department's cases of child abuse and neglect that involve a
450 parent or guardian with a substance abuse problem and utilize such
451 data to develop strategies to reduce the number of such cases in the
452 future.

453 Sec. 12. Subsection (b) of section 17a-450a of the general statutes is
454 repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July*
455 *1, 2009*):

456 (b) The Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services shall
457 constitute a successor department to the addiction services component
458 of the Department of Public Health and Addiction Services. Whenever
459 the words "Commissioner of Public Health and Addiction Services" are
460 used or referred to in the following general statutes, the words
461 "Commissioner of Mental Health and Addiction Services" shall be
462 substituted in lieu thereof and whenever the words "Department of
463 Public Health and Addiction Services" are used or referred to in the
464 following general statutes, the words "Department of Mental Health
465 and Addiction Services" shall be substituted in lieu thereof: 4a-12, [17a-
466 3,] 17a-465a, 17a-670 to 17a-676, inclusive, 17a-678 to 17a-682, inclusive,
467 17a-684 to 17a-687, inclusive, 17a-691, 17a-694, 17a-710, 17a-712, 17a-
