EXPLANATION OF STATE IMPACT OF REGULATION:

The proposed regulations update the regulations for the Long Term Care Ombudsman program and bring the program into compliance with the Older Americans Act, 42 USC SS 3058g.

The issues that the regulation propose to address include; (1) an outline of the responsibilities of the State Ombudsman and Regional Ombudsman; (2) define the organization of the program within the Department of Social Services; (3) set forth the program's advocacy role for long-term care residents; (4) the requirements for training and the curriculum for Volunteer Resident Advocates; (5) establish conflict of interest guidelines; and (6) prohibits long-term care facilities from interfering with contacts between residents and program representatives.

The main provisions of the regulation provide: (1) definitions; (2) organization and administration of programs; (3) program requirements; (4) establishment of a course of training for volunteer resident advocates; (5) conflict of interest guidelines; and (6) prohibits interference by long-term care facilities regarding communications between residents and program representatives.

The provisions within the proposed regulation changes are technical in nature and conform to existing practice. All expenditures, such as for training, are covered under federal funds allocated to the Long Term Care Ombudsman's program.

While the Department does not anticipate that the proposed regulations will have a significant impact on small businesses, small businesses will have the opportunity to bring any unanticipated concerns to the Department's attention through notice and public comment.
