
Central service technicians are responsible for ensuring that instrumentation and equipment used in medical and surgical procedures are properly cleaned, disinfected, inspected and sterilized prior to patient use. Clearly, this is a critical component in the delivery of quality patient care and a step in the right direction of lowering health care costs overall.

I am a member of the International Association of Healthcare Central Service Materiel Management (IAHCSMM), which represents approximately 19,000 central service technicians in the U.S. and abroad who facilitate the procurement, management and processing of surgical instruments, supplies and equipment.

We believe central service technicians must be certified and receive continuing education in order to perform their daily duties safely, effectively and consistently. New Jersey is the only state to require certification for central service technicians.

Please support No. 894 when it comes before your committee on March 15th.
