Substitute Senate Bill No. 464

Senate, April 8, 2014

The Committee on Judiciary reported through SEN. COLEMAN of the 2nd Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT CONCERNING THE ADMINISTRATION OF HAIR FOLLICLE DRUG TESTING BY CLINICAL LABORATORIES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective October 1, 2014*) No clinical laboratory, as
2 defined in section 19a-30 of the general statutes, that offers hair follicle
3 drug testing as part of its array of diagnostic testing services shall
4 refuse to administer a hair follicle drug test that has been ordered by a
5 physician or physician assistant, licensed under chapter 370 of the
6 general statutes, or an advanced practice registered nurse, licensed
7 under chapter 378 of the general statutes.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Section 1	<i>October 1, 2014</i>	New section
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Statement of Legislative Commissioners:

In section 1, the definition of "clinical laboratory" was inserted for clarity and statutory consistency and "when such drug test has been ordered" was changed to "that has been ordered" for conciseness.

OLR Bill Analysis**sSB 464*****AN ACT CONCERNING THE ADMINISTRATION OF HAIR FOLLICLE DRUG TESTING BY CLINICAL LABORATORIES.*****SUMMARY:**

This bill requires a clinical laboratory to administer a hair follicle drug test if (1) the laboratory offers that test as a diagnostic testing service and (2) the test is ordered by a licensed physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse.

Under the bill, a “clinical laboratory” is any facility or other area used for microbiological, serological, chemical, hematological, immunohematological, biophysical, cytological, pathological, or other examinations of human body fluids, secretions, excretions, or excised or exfoliated tissues, to provide information for the (1) diagnosis, prevention, or treatment of human disease or impairment; (2) assessment of human health; or (3) presence of drugs, poisons, or other toxicological substances.
