



## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION AND JUDICIAL BRANCH RESIDENTIAL HOUSING FACILITIES

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### DOC AND JUDICIAL BRANCH RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

DOC contracts with nonprofit community agencies for 1,167 beds in at least 19 different towns.

The Judicial Branch operates two juvenile detention centers and contracts for 726 beds in at least 14 different towns.

### QUESTION

How many residential programs are operated by or under contract with the Department of Correction (DOC) and Judicial Branch? Where are they located? How many beds are available?

### SUMMARY

As of July 2013, DOC contracted with 25 nonprofit community agencies for 47 residential programs with 1,167 residential beds located in 19 different towns (DOC, *Directory of Contracted Community Programs*, July 2013). While most of these programs have a specific address, 14 offer scattered site supportive housing beds and we do not have the addresses for these locations.

According to the Judicial Branch, as of May 2014, the branch operated two juvenile detention centers, contracted for 14 residential programs, and purchased beds from an additional 21 programs operated under DMHAS or DOC contracts. These programs offered a total of 726 beds in FY 14. They operate in 14 different towns and one offers scattered site apartments for which we do not have an address.

The tables below list information on these programs.

## DOC RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

DOC releases inmates into the community in a number of different circumstances, such as on a work release program or parole. DOC contracts with private entities for residential facilities that provide services to some of these inmates. DOC residential programs include work release; substance abuse, mental health, and sex offender treatment programs; women and children programs (typically a work release program that allows children to live with their mother and receive services); and scattered site supportive and temporary supportive housing programs.

Table 1 lists these DOC-contracted programs, organized by town and address. For each program, it includes the program type, provider and program name, number of available beds, and gender served by the program.

## **JUDICIAL BRANCH RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES**

The Judicial Branch operates two juvenile detention centers and contracts with private entities to offer residential facilities for a number of reasons, including for alternatives to incarceration and treatment programs for adults and juveniles. According to information provided by the Judicial Branch, their residential programs fall into four categories:

1. juvenile detention centers operated by the branch,
2. programs under contract with the branch or the Court Support Services Division (CSSD),
3. beds purchased by the branch or CSSD from a program under contract with DMHAS (governed by a memorandum of agreement (MOA)), and
4. beds purchased by the branch or CSSD from a program under contract with DOC (governed by a MOA).

Table 2 lists the Judicial Branch programs in each category, organized by town and address. For each program, it includes the program type, provider name, number of available beds in FY 14, and bed utilization rate based on the six months covering October 1, 2013 through March 31, 2014.
