*A non-profit, non-partisan organization founded in 1943, NFIB is Connecticut's and the nation's leading small-business association. In Connecticut, NFIB represents thousands of members and their employees. NFIB membership is scattered across the state and ranges from sophisticated high technology enterprises to "Main Street" small businesses to single-person "Mom & Pop" shops that operate in traditional ways. NFIB's mission is "To promote and protect the right of its members to own, operate, and grow their businesses." On behalf of those small- and independent- job-providers in Connecticut, NFIB/Connecticut offers the following comments:*

NFIB/Connecticut supports SB-697. This pro-small business bill would create and establish a "Learner's Permit" program for entrepreneurs and new businesses for the first two years of operation. The key aspect of this legislation is that the permit would require the waiver of any state or municipal filing, licensing or permitting fee associated with starting a new business.

According to the 2012 edition of the "Small Business Problems & Priorities" report by the NFIB Research Foundation, small business problems generally fall within one of ten generic problem clusters. Each cluster contains all of the survey's problems related to that topic. In order of importance, "Taxes", "Regulations" and "Costs" make up the top three problem clusters respectively. Problems related to state and local permits, filings, fees and the related paperwork burden help make up these problem clusters. When a business is in its infancy, the time and expenses involved in obtaining various and multiple licenses, permits and compliance with filings can stymie both the productivity and cash flow of a new business – two key metrics for success. This legislation can directly assist these business owners during this initial phase. Moreover, due to the alarming decrease in business ownership among people under 30 (recently reached a 24-year-low according to new data – See "Endangered Species: Young U.S. Entrepreneurs, *Wall Street Journal*, 1/2/15), it is more important than ever that the state of Connecticut does everything it can to help incubate (as opposed to exterminate) new businesses and entrepreneurs. Legislation such as SB-744 can go a long way to help in this regard.

NFIB/Connecticut thanks both the proponent and the leadership and members of the Commerce Committee for its consideration of this legislation. We would be happy to work interested parties in this endeavor. We are hopeful that this legislation will move forward and as such, NFIB urges lawmakers to approve SB-697.
