House Bill No. 5921

House of Representatives, March 31, 2015

The Committee on Public Safety and Security reported through REP. DARGAN of the 115th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the bill ought to pass.

AN ACT REQUIRING THE DISPLAY OF HOUSE NUMBERS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective October 1, 2015*) (a) The owner of a
2 residential building shall affix numerals to such building indicating the
3 street number assigned to such building by the town or, if there is no
4 record of such assignment, the street number customarily used for
5 such building.

6 (b) The numerals used to indicate the street number of a building
7 shall be:

8 (1) Located on the exterior front of the building;

9 (2) At least three inches in height;

10 (3) Of a color contrasting with the color of the background material
11 to which the numerals are affixed; and

12 (4) Positioned not less than four feet or more than twelve feet above

13 the surface of the ground.

14 (c) The location and size of the numerals shall be sufficient to ensure
15 their legibility when the building is viewed from one or more points
16 along the centerline of the street on which the building fronts between
17 projections of the sides of the building intersecting perpendicularly
18 with such centerline.

19 (d) If a building is set back more than one hundred feet from the
20 centerline of the street on which the building fronts, or if the numerals
21 are not legible from such centerline because of an obstruction, the
22 owner of the building shall affix an additional set of numerals to a
23 post, sign, mailbox or other device located within ten feet of the
24 driveway entrance to the building. The additional set of numerals shall
25 meet the specifications set forth in subdivisions (2) to (4), inclusive, of
26 subsection (b) of this section.

27 (e) Violation of any provision of this section shall be an infraction.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Explanation

This bill will result in a revenue gain of less than \$2,000 per year beginning in FY 16. It is anticipated that the number of infractions issued will be relatively low and that first time offenders would receive a warning before being fined.

The Out Years

The annualized ongoing fiscal impact identified above would continue into the future subject to inflation.

OLR Bill Analysis**HB 5921*****AN ACT REQUIRING THE DISPLAY OF HOUSE NUMBERS.*****SUMMARY:**

This bill requires the owner of a residential building to display the building's street number on the exterior front of the building. If a building is set back more than 100 feet from the center of the street it faces, or if the numbers would not be legible from the street center because of an obstruction, the owner must also place the numbers on a post, sign, mailbox, or other device located within 10 feet of the building's driveway entrance.

Under the bill, the street number is the number the town assigns to the building or, if there is no record of assignment, the street number customarily used. The bill specifies standards the numbers must meet and where they must be placed.

A violation is an infraction.

EFFECTIVE DATE: October 1, 2015

STANDARDS FOR STREET NUMBERS

Under the bill, house numbers must be at least three inches high, and placed between four and 12 feet above the ground. The color of the numbers must contrast with the color of the background material to which they are affixed, and they must be legible when the building is viewed from at least one point on the street in front of the building.
