Substitute Senate Bill No. 1036

*Senate, March 30, 2015*

The Committee on Labor and Public Employees reported through SEN. GOMES of the 23rd Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

## **AN ACT CONCERNING UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION.**

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (*Effective July 1, 2015*) The Labor Commissioner shall  
2 conduct a study to evaluate the effectiveness of the current  
3 unemployment compensation system within the state. The  
4 commissioner shall report, in accordance with the provisions of section  
5 11-4a of the general statutes, the findings of such study to the joint  
6 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of  
7 matters relating to labor and public employees on or before February  
8 1, 2016.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Section 1	<i>July 1, 2015</i>	New section
