American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network Testimony**

**SB 295 - AN ACT CONCERNING RADIOLOGICAL AND IMAGING SERVICES**

During challenging economic conditions it is understandable that difficult choices have to be made. These are decisions that need to be made with careful and deliberate consideration, and we recognize the efforts of the Governor and the Legislature in achieving that end. As careful as these decisions need to be, there also needs to be deliberation regarding the long-term effects that specific actions may have. In 2016 it is estimated that approximately 21,700 Connecticut residents will be diagnosed with cancer while 6,780 will die from the disease.

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) supports SB 295– **AN ACT CONCERNING RADIOLOGICAL AND IMAGING SERVICES**. The bill requires the Commissioner of Public Health to conduct a study of the impact on patient access to care due to the changes in reimbursements for radiological and imaging services as prescribed in Medicaid state plan amendment 15-020. The Commissioner would be required to submit a report on the results of the study, including recommendations to address any access issues, to the Legislature by January 1, 2017.

As part of the painful cuts made last year, the reimbursement methodology in Medicaid state plan for radiological and imaging services was reduced by 42.5%. The Governor's FY '17 budget revision seeks to make those cuts permanent. While implementation is ongoing, the impact will likely be significant, especially in areas with smaller hospitals and lower capacity. Medicaid rate reimbursement cuts are leading to fewer providers accepting new Medicaid clients and, coupled with non-Medicaid cuts to hospitals that have already led to reductions in services to patients, appropriate and adequate access to patient care is threatened.

The study called for in SB 295 will provide a clear picture of the impact on patient access as well as recommendations for potential improvements. We will be very interested in the findings and recommendations of the report and urge passage of the bill.
