The Connecticut Conference of Municipalities (CCM) is Connecticut's statewide association of towns and cities and the voice of local government - your partners in governing Connecticut. Our members represent over 96% of Connecticut's population. We appreciate the opportunity to testify on bills of interest to towns and cities.

### **H.B 5128 “An Act Concerning Beneficial End Uses for Discarded Tires and the Efficacy of Tire Hauling Licenses for Permits.”**

CCM supports H.B 5128 as it would require the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection to identify beneficial end uses for discarded tires and evaluate the viability of establishing a state-wide tire stewardship program in order to facilitate such beneficial end use of tires.

It is estimated that in Connecticut more than 3.4 million tires become scrap every year. Many of these tires are illegally dumped in towns and cities, polluting the environment, producing blight and forcing municipalities to shoulder the cost of collecting, transporting and disposing of these tires.

A tire stewardship program, would require tire producers be responsible for creating and financing the beneficial end use of tires in the state, in order to (1) minimize public sector involvement in the management of discarded tires; (2) provide for free, convenient and accessible state-wide opportunities for the receipt of discarded tires; (3) provide for the free collection of discarded tires from municipal transfer stations that accumulate and segregate fewer than one hundred tires, provided any such municipal transfer station requires collection due to space or permit requirements; (4) provide for producer-financed end-of-life management for discarded tires; and (5) provide for suitable storage and transport arrangements for discarded tires, at no cost to such municipality.

Similar to the Mattress and Paint Stewardship and E-Waste programs preceding it, a properly designed Tire Stewardship Program would take the financial and administrative burden of end-of-life disposal for these items off the back of local governments and the state. This is a no-cost proposal for the state and could result in significant statewide savings for municipalities.
