Substitute Senate Bill No. 344

Senate, March 28, 2018

The Committee on Environment reported through SEN. KENNEDY of the 12th Dist. and SEN. MINER of the 30th Dist., Chairpersons of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT CONCERNING A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AND REGULATIONS FOR ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE DEVICES REQUIRED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) The Commissioner of
2 Agriculture shall enter a memorandum of understanding with
3 aquaculture licensees for the utilization of electronic surveillance
4 devices by the Department of Agriculture to monitor the locations of
5 such licensees. Such memorandum of understanding shall: (1)
6 Prescribe the conditions and requirements of utilizing such
7 surveillance devices, (2) provide that such monitoring is for the
8 purpose of assuring the safety of the products of such licensees, (3)
9 require any costs associated with such devices, including, but not
10 limited to, any service for the use of such devices, shall be paid by the
11 Department of Agriculture, and (4) prohibit the disclosure of any data
12 received or collected by the department as a result of utilizing such
13 devices. Such memorandum of understanding shall be effective until

14 the effective date of the regulations described in section 2 of this act.

15 Sec. 2. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) Not later than July 1, 2020, the
16 Department of Agriculture shall adopt regulations, in accordance with
17 the provisions of chapter 54 of the general statutes, to establish criteria
18 for the enforcement of any requirement that any aquaculture licensee
19 utilize an electronic surveillance device. Such regulations shall include,
20 but need not be limited to, the establishment of any applicable fees and
21 mandatory fines for violating any provisions of such regulations and
22 protocols for the storage and safeguarding of any data collected by the
23 department as a result of requiring the use of such electronic
24 surveillance devices.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Explanation

The bill requires the Department of Agriculture (DoAg) to: (1) enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with shell fishing licensees allowing DoAg to use electronic surveillance devices to monitor vessel locations, (2) by July 1, 2020, adopt regulations establishing criteria for enforcing that the licensees use the devices, and (3) that any costs associated with the devices, including service costs, be paid by DoAg.

This results in total costs of \$125,000 in FY 19 (including one-time equipment costs of \$10,000 to outfit the 47 vessels still requiring monitoring systems) and costs of \$115,000 in FY 20 annually and thereafter associated with ongoing monitoring system maintenance.

Lastly, the bill requires that regulations by July 1, 2020 must include fees and mandatory fines for violations for enforcement of the bill's provisions. Any revenue collected for this purpose is anticipated to be minimal since vessels would be expected to comply with the new monitoring system.

The Out Years

The annualized ongoing fiscal impact identified above would continue into the future subject to inflation and the cost of on ongoing maintenance.

This bill requires the Department of Agriculture (DoAg) commissioner to (1) enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with aquaculture (e.g., shell fishing) licensees for DoAg to use electronic surveillance devices to monitor their locations and (2) by July 1, 2020, adopt regulations establishing criteria for enforcing a requirement that the licensees use the devices. The bill requires that the MOU be in effect until the regulations take effect.

Under the bill, the MOU must:

1. set conditions and requirements for using the devices;
2. state that the monitoring's purpose is to assure the safety of the licensees' products;
3. require any cost associated with the devices to be paid by DoAg, including any service cost for their use; and
4. prohibit DoAg from disclosing any data it receives or collects from the devices.

The regulations must establish (1) any applicable fees and mandatory fines for violations and (2) protocols for storing and safeguarding the data DoAg collects from the devices.
