### ***Explanation***

The amendment results in a cost and associated state mandate to local and regional boards of education as it requires schools to maintain opioid antagonists for the purposes of emergency first aid to students who experience a drug overdose. The costs result from purchasing naloxone doses. It is estimated that naloxone costs between \$20 - \$40 per dose. It is uncertain how many doses each district would be required to purchase, but it estimated that the cost would be less than \$5,000 per district. These costs would recur every 18 months to restock per current manufacturer guidelines. The actual cost would vary by the size of the district and the number of doses that are used

annually.

There is no cost to State Department of Education (SDE) to develop first aid training related to administering naloxone and other first aid related issues as they have the staff and expertise necessary to perform this requirement.

It is anticipated that SDE will distribute the annual training program to local and regional boards of education via email and a link to Internet-available training; thus there will be no cost.
