

Dear Members of the Insurance and Real State Committee of Connecticut General Assembly:

My name is Alana, and I am an undergraduate student. I am an ally of the immigrant community and I stand in support of **HB5251- AN ACT ESTABLISHING A TASK FORCE TO STUDY HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS IN THIS STATE**. This bill would create a task force to study the current state of healthcare access for undocumented immigrants, and to promote increased insurance coverage for these communities.

I believe that healthcare should not have barriers based on race, citizenship status, or any other marginalized identity. I have had the privilege to receive quality healthcare throughout my life, and because of this, I have had opportunities to pursue my passion for helping others and bettering my community. Undocumented immigrants should have this same opportunity - our entire state and community will benefit!

The establishment of this task force is a *critical* step that our state must take in favor of *saving lives*. Being undocumented does not make any individual less deserving of healthcare, or any other basic human right. Citizenship status should not be a determinant of health and wellness — but by limiting undocumented individuals' access to healthcare, the state of Connecticut is perpetuating health disparities and systemic inequities within communities of color. This is no longer a matter of policy alone: this is a matter of life and death.

Expanding HUSKY coverage to undocumented immigrants is necessary, but this expansion must be done thoughtfully and with immigrants' lived experiences in mind. To this end, the task force cannot be comprised of politicians alone: diverse voices and representatives from advocacy organizations are key to the success of this task force. For this reason, we ask that individuals from groups such as the Connecticut Immigrants Rights Alliance, Connecticut Students for a Dream, the Universal Health Care Foundation, and Health Equity Solutions be included in the task force.

Healthcare is a human right, and should not be restricted to privileged individuals. When we deny our people healthcare, we are also denying them the right to caring for their families, contributing to our communities, and living a happy and fulfilling life. Healthcare is absolutely necessary for all people, and there is no excuse to deny this right.

In conclusion, I would like to restate my strong support for HB5251. The state of Connecticut cannot remain complicit in systemic discrimination against immigrant communities — they are *people* worthy of dignity and respect, and must be treated as such. The establishment of this task force is the least our state can do, and I ask the committee to vote favorably on this important and necessary measure.
