Substitute House Bill No. 6343

*House of Representatives, April 13, 2021*

The Committee on Labor and Public Employees reported through REP. PORTER of the 94th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

## ***AN ACT CONCERNING A STUDY OF GIG WORKERS.***

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (*Effective from passage*) (a) The Labor Commissioner shall, in  
2 consultation with gig workers and other stakeholders and the  
3 chairpersons of the joint standing committee of the General Assembly  
4 having cognizance of matters relating to labor, conduct a study of gig  
5 workers in this state.

6 (b) Not later than January 1, 2022, the commissioner shall report the  
7 results of the study, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a  
8 of the general statutes, to the joint standing committee of the General  
9 Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to labor. Such report  
10 shall include recommendations for legislation regarding gig workers.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:
