1: I support the extension of the reassessments until the foundation is repaired. The numbers of pending claimants far exceed the current allocated funding amounts. It is only fair to assess these compromised homes based on their current condition, and not apply an arbitrary timed frame for the tax relief.

2. I wholeheartedly support the necessity of quarries preparing and providing source reports to the state geologist. All studies show we live in a geological region that contains iron sulfide minerals and it is only prudent to require companies doing business in this state to produce reports that confirm they are providing a quality product to consumers.

And of course, we need to have a benchmark against which to have the content of the aggregate evaluated. We need standards against which to evaluate the products.

I support the continued operation of the Captive Insurance Company as they have developed a proven process to remediate single family homes and are starting on condominiums. To lose that expertise when there are hundreds if not thousands of homes remaining would be short sighted and costly to Connecticut.

I also support the extension of the \$12 charge on the policies listed. This is a reasonable revenue source for the extensive cost of foundation replacement and is a fair process as any foundation can be impacted.
