AN ACT CONCERNING BLOCKCHAIN AND EMERGING TECHNOLOGIES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (*Effective from passage*) (a) As used in this section:

2 (1) "Blockchain technology" means distributed ledger technology that
3 uses a distributed, decentralized, shared and replicated ledger that may
4 be public or private, permissioned or permissionless and that may
5 include the use of electronic currencies or electronic tokens as a medium
6 of electronic exchange; and

7 (2) "Distributed ledger technology" means any database that is
8 consensually shared and synchronized across multiple sites, institutions
9 or geographies allowing for public witnesses to such transactions and
10 may include supporting infrastructure, including blockchain
11 technology.

12 (b) On or before October 1, 2021, the Department of Administrative
13 Services shall develop and issue a request for information for the

14 incorporation of blockchain technology to make a state administrative
15 function more efficient or cost-effective.

16 (c) Not later than January 1, 2022, the Commissioner of
17 Administrative Services shall evaluate the responses to the request for
18 information and submit a report, in accordance with the provisions of
19 section 11-4a of the general statutes, identifying department functions
20 that may be made more efficient or cost-effective by blockchain
21 technology to the joint standing committees of the General Assembly
22 having cognizance of matters relating to commerce and government
23 administration.

24 Sec. 2. (*Effective from passage*) On or before January 1, 2022, the
25 Commissioner of Economic and Community Development shall
26 develop a plan to support the state's remote work economy, including,
27 but not limited to, the promotion of existing remote work workspaces
28 and incentives for the creation of new remote work workspaces in the
29 state. Not later than January 1, 2022, the commissioner shall submit, in
30 accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes,
31 such plan to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly
32 having cognizance of matters relating to commerce.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Statement of Purpose:

To require (1) the Department of Administrative Services to issue a request for information for the incorporation of blockchain technology to make a state administrative function more efficient or cost effective, and (2) the Department of Economic and Community Development to develop a plan to promote existing remote work workspaces and incentivize the creation of new remote work workspaces.
