Substitute Senate Bill No. 213

Senate, March 30, 2022

The Committee on Public Health reported through SEN. DAUGHERTY ABRAMS of the 13th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the Senate, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT ALLOWING MEDICAL ASSISTANTS TO ADMINISTER VACCINES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective October 1, 2022*) (a) For purposes of this
2 section, "medical assistant" means a person who (1) (A) is certified by
3 the American Association of Medical Assistants, the National
4 Healthcareer Association, the National Center for Competency Testing
5 or the American Medical Technologists, and (B) has graduated from a
6 postsecondary medical assisting program (i) accredited by the
7 Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs, the
8 Accrediting Bureau of Health Education Schools or another accrediting
9 organization recognized by the United States Department of Education,
10 or (ii) offered by an institution of higher education accredited by an
11 accrediting organization recognized by the United States Department of
12 Education, or (2) has completed relevant medical assistant training
13 provided by any branch of the armed forces of the United States.

14 (b) A medical assistant may administer a vaccine under the
 15 supervision, control and responsibility of a physician licensed pursuant
 16 to chapter 370 of the general statutes, a physician assistant licensed
 17 pursuant to chapter 370 of the general statutes or an advanced practice
 18 registered nurse licensed pursuant to chapter 378 of the general statutes
 19 to any person in any setting other than a hospital setting. Prior to
 20 administering a vaccine, a medical assistant shall complete not less than
 21 twenty-four hours of classroom training and not less than eight hours of
 22 training in a clinical setting regarding the administration of vaccines.
 23 Nothing in this section shall be construed to permit an employer of a
 24 physician, a physician assistant or an advanced practice registered nurse
 25 to require the physician, physician assistant or advanced practice
 26 registered nurse to oversee a medical assistant in the administration of
 27 a vaccine without the consent of the physician, physician assistant or
 28 advanced practice registered nurse.

29 (c) On or before January first annually, the Commissioner of Public
 30 Health shall obtain from the American Association of Medical
 31 Assistants, the National Healthcareer Association, the National Center
 32 for Competency Testing and the American Medical Technologists a
 33 listing of all state residents maintained on said organizations' registries
 34 of certified medical assistants. The commissioner shall make such
 35 listings available for public inspection.

36 Sec. 2. Section 19a-6f of the general statutes is repealed. (*Effective*
 37 *October 1, 2022*)

OLR Bill Analysis**sSB 213****AN ACT ALLOWING MEDICAL ASSISTANTS TO ADMINISTER VACCINES.****SUMMARY**

This bill allows medical assistants to administer vaccines, under certain conditions, in any setting other than a hospital. They may do so only if they (1) meet certain certification, education, and training requirements and (2) act under the supervision, control, and responsibility of a licensed physician, physician assistant (PA), or advanced practice registered nurse (APRN). The bill specifies that it does not authorize employers to require physicians, PAs, or APRNs, without their consent, to oversee medical assistants administering vaccines.

The bill also makes a corresponding change by adding to the list of organizations from whom the Department of Public Health (DPH) must obtain a list of state residents certified as medical assistants.

EFFECTIVE DATE: October 1, 2022

REQUIRED CERTIFICATION, EDUCATION, AND TRAINING

To be eligible to administer vaccines under the bill, a medical assistant generally must be certified by the American Association of Medical Assistants, the National Healthcareer Association, the National Center for Competency Testing, or the American Medical Technologists.

The medical assistant also generally must have graduated from a postsecondary medical assisting program that is either:

1. accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs, the Accrediting Bureau of Health Education Schools, or another accrediting organization

recognized by the U.S. Department of Education or

- 2. offered by a higher education institution accredited by an accrediting organization recognized by the U.S. Department of Education.

The bill’s authorization also applies to medical assistants who do not meet the above certification and education requirements but who completed relevant medical assistant training provided by any branch of the U.S. armed forces.

The bill requires any medical assistant, before administering vaccines, to complete at least 24 hours of classroom training and eight hours of clinical training on vaccine administration.

LIST OF CERTIFIED MEDICAL ASSISTANTS

Under current law, the DPH commissioner must annually obtain from the American Association of Medical Assistants and the National Healthcareer Association a list of all state residents on each organization’s registry of certified medical assistants. The bill extends this requirement to also include comparable lists from the National Center for Competency Testing and the American Medical Technologists. As under existing law, DPH must make these lists available for public inspection.
