### **RESOLUTION CONCERNING CERTAIN WITCHCRAFT CONVICTIONS IN COLONIAL CONNECTICUT.**

Resolved by this Assembly:

1       WHEREAS, the courts in the early British colonies of Connecticut and  
2       New Haven indicted at least thirty-four women and men for the alleged  
3       crimes of witchcraft and familiarities with the devil and convicted  
4       twelve of them, executing eleven, and it is now accepted by the historical  
5       profession and society as a whole that all the accused were innocent of  
6       such charges, and

7       WHEREAS, legal procedures differed at the time and many practices  
8       of the Colonial courts would not meet modern American standards of  
9       proof, so that the miscarriage of justice was facilitated by such  
10      procedures, and

11      WHEREAS, the status of women was radically different than it is  
12      today, and misogyny played a large part in the trials and in denying  
13      defendants their rights and dignity, and

14 WHEREAS, community strife and panic combined with  
15 overwhelming fear and superstition led to these accusations of alleged  
16 witchcraft and the subsequent suffering of those accused.

17 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all of the formally  
18 convicted and executed are absolved of all crimes of witchcraft and  
19 familiarities with the devil. The legislature specifically absolves the  
20 following people believed to have been convicted and executed for the  
21 crimes of witchcraft and familiarities with the devil: Alice Young in  
22 1647, Mary Johnson in 1648, Joan Carrington in 1651, John Carrington in  
23 1651, Goodwife Bassett in 1651, Goodwife Knapp in 1653, Lydia Gilbert  
24 in 1654, Mary Sanford in 1662, Nathaniel Greensmith in 1663, Rebecca  
25 Greensmith in 1663, and Mary Barnes in 1663; and one Elizabeth Seager  
26 convicted and reprieved in 1665.

27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that those who were indicted for the  
28 crimes of witchcraft and familiarities with the devil, forced to flee,  
29 banished or even acquitted continued to live with their reputations  
30 destroyed and their family names tarnished, will have their reputations  
31 restored and no longer have disgrace attached to their names, now,  
32 being in good standing in the state of Connecticut. The following  
33 indicted for the crimes of witchcraft and familiarities with the devil who  
34 were not convicted but still suffered greatly after indictments were:  
35 Goodwife Bailey in 1655, Nicholas Bailey in 1655, Elizabeth Godman in  
36 1655, Elizabeth Garlick in 1658, Margaret Jennings in 1661, Nicholas  
37 Jennings in 1661, Judith Varlet in 1662, Andrew Sanford in 1662, William  
38 Ayers in 1662, Judith Ayers in 1662, James Wakely in 1662, Katherine  
39 Harrison in 1668 and 1669, William Graves in 1667, Elizabeth Clawson  
40 in 1692, Hugh Crosia in 1692, Mercy Disborough in 1692, Mary Harvey  
41 in 1692, Hannah Harvey in 1692, Mary Staples in 1692, Winifred Benham  
42 in 1697, and Winifred Benham Jr. in 1697.

43 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the State of Connecticut  
44 apologizes to the descendants of all those who were indicted for the  
45 crimes of witchcraft and familiarities with the devil, convicted and  
46 executed and for the harm done to the accused persons' posterity to the

47 present day, and acknowledges the trauma and shame that wrongfully  
48 continued to affect the families of the accused.
