OFA Fiscal Note

Potential Cost

The amendment strikes the underlying bill and its associated fiscal impact resulting in the following impact.

Section 3 requires serious juvenile offenses to be transferred to the regular criminal docket resulting in a potential marginal cost to the Department of Correction and a potential marginal savings to the Judicial Department to the extent these violations occur.

Section 6 broadens the definition of victim which may result in a cost to the Office of Victim Services to the extent that more individuals qualify for certain victim services.

Section 7 allows victims of property crime done by a minor to apply for victim compensation from the Office of Victim Services (OVS) and results in a cost to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund (CICF) to the extent that these types of property crimes occur, and claims are approved by OVS.

The amendment makes various changes to statutes concerning juvenile justice that do not result in a fiscal impact to the state.
