My name is Jason Piccirillo. I am a Connecticut resident, a local business owner, a tax payer, and a legal firearms owner. I am writing you today in response to numerous gun control bills proposed. There are many which I oppose, however I do agree with some.

I completely agree that more needs to be done to keep firearms out of the wrong hands, but I disagree with the route that is being taken to accomplish this. Somewhere along the lines, firearms have gone from Americas past time, to Americas black sheep. I don't really know why or when exactly this turning point happened, but it saddens me to see this happening. I have been an avid sport shooter since my father bought me my first .22 when I was 4 years old. I also have been a hunter since I was 12. Firearms have always been a part of my life, and I believe they played a key roll in the man I am today. I can remember back when I received my first gun for Christmas. It was stored with a trigger lock on it, on a rack over my bed. I made sure it was cleaned, locked, and stored after every use. There was nothing more I looked forward to, than a day at the range with my father. He taught me the fundamentals of shooting, and more importantly, safety. He taught me not only how to use my gun, but to respect it, and the responsibility that came along with it.
