The Putnam Phalanx.; THEY VISIT THE TOMB OF WASHINGTON.

The Putnam Phalanx, of Hartford, Conn., whose intended visit to Mount Vernon has for some time been announced, arrived in this City, by the New-Haven train, yesterday about 3 o'clock, P.M., having been detained some two hours at Stamford, Conn. They marched from Twenty-third-street, passing through Union-square, where they paused for a short time and paid their respects to the equestrian statue of WASHINGTON. Their arrival and march attracted great attention, and from the cars to the Astor House they were escorted by a large assemblage of people. They wear the uniform of the Continental Army, pure and simple, which certainly never appeared so well since it was worn by our fathers, as it does upon the Putnam Phalanx. Many of the members of this corps are men extraordinary for their physical proportions, several of the officers for their venerable years, and all, without exception, for their soldierly bearing. Mayor GOODWIN, the Commander, stands six feet six inches in his stockings, and is a most venerable personage, his flowing hair and beard being of a snowy whiteness. Notwithstanding he is near seventy years of age he walks with a step as elastic, and a gait as erect as the youngest of the corps. They number 90 muskets, and traveling with them on this pilgrimage to the Tomb of WASHINGTON are a large number of honorary members. They proceeded to the Astor House, where dinner had been long in waiting for them. There they spent about an hour, and then reformed and marched at 5 o'clock to the Jersey City ferry, which they crossed and then took the cars for Philadelphia en route to Washington. Com-Company 3, of the Continental Guard of this City, Capt. WM. RAINIER did escort duty on the occasion. The following are the officers of the Company: Major Horace Goodwin; Staff Adjutant Joseph D. Williams; Quarter-Master, E.B. Strong; Paymaster, Jas. B. Crosby; Commissary, Henry C. Denning; Assistant-Commissary, Alonzo W. Brige, Judge Advocate, Isaac W. Stewart; Chaplain, Rev. Asher Moore; Surgeon, Dr. Thomas Miner; Sergeant-Major, Wm. Isham; Quarter-master-sergent, Oliver Ellsworth; Ensign Wm. J.D. Enslow.

The following is the programme of their movement: They arrive in Philadelphia to-night, and leave thence for Baltimore at noon on Tuesday, where they remain until Wednesday at 4 P.M. They then start for Washington, where they spend Wednesday night, and on Thursday proceed to Mount Vernon, and return to Washington the same day. On Friday they leave for home, and will arrive in New-York Saturday morning. After tarrying to obtain refreshments, they take the afternoon train for Hartford.
