EXPLANATION OF ESTIMATES:

STATE IMPACT: The passage of this bill as amended could result in a potential minimal revenue gain. The bill as amended allows a local building official to enforce certain State occupational licensing requirements by prohibiting workers who do not have the required permits, certificates, or licenses from working at the site. A written notice would be sent to the building permit holder. There is the potential for a minimal revenue gain to the extent that enforcement of occupational licensing requirements results in additional licenses being issued.

House Amendment "A" eliminated the provisions in the original bill that would have allowed the local building official to halt work on the project and substituted the provision that he may prohibit the unlicensed worker from working at the site. This has minimal fiscal impact.

House Amendment "C" makes technical changes to the original bill and has no fiscal impact.

House Amendment "D" allows the chief municipal executive to appoint an acting building official on a temporary basis for up to 180 days, and has minimal fiscal impact.

MUNICIPAL IMPACT: The passage of this bill as amended could result in additional costs to municipalities that are anticipated to be minimal and absorbed within existing resources. The bill as amended allows a local

building official to enforce occupational licensing requirements by prohibiting workers who do not have the required permits, certificates or licenses from working at the site. A written notice would be sent to the building permit holder. This could result in minimal, absorbable costs.

The bill as amended also allows the chief municipal executive to appoint an acting building official on a temporary basis for up to 180 days. This has minimal fiscal impact.

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
