EXPLANATION OF ESTIMATES:

STATE AND MUNICIPAL IMPACT: Passage of this bill as amended would allow the Department of Environmental Protection to issue general permits in the areas of stationary air pollution sources, tidal wetlands and structures and dredging in navigable waters, to streamline the hearing process, and other procedures; and allows rather than requires certain regulations. These changes would reduce paperwork and other administrative costs and enable the DEP to reduce its current permit and regulation backlog and focus decreased agency resources on major activities. However, requiring that DEP adopt regulations on requirements of plans for the disposal or recycling of ash residue will require the use of resources not currently budgeted for. It is anticipated that \$25,000 to \$50,000 in additional funds or 1/2 to 1 full person year and associated costs would be needed to comply with this requirement. It is anticipated that the issuance of general permits will have no net effect on fee revenue. The various streamlining provisions in the bill will minimally reduce the administrative costs to various State agencies and municipalities. In addition, requiring DEP to review permit procedures and submit a plan for streamlining to the Commerce and Exportation and Environment Committees can be handled within existing resources since the agency is, and has been working in these areas.

Provisions of the bill as amended concerning the creation of a new task force will have no net increase in costs to the State since the bill also eliminates an existing task force. Considering additional information when making a determination will not have a fiscal impact on DEP.

Finally, requiring that any person, firm or corporation which has filed an application for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need with the Connecticut Siting Council for the construction or operation of a woodburning facility pay \$100,000 to a municipality would increase revenue to any host municipality. Two facilities; Torrington and Killingly have applications pending.

House "A" is technical and doesn't change the impact of the bill. House "E" adds the regulatory requirement and increases costs to DEP.

Senate "B" increases municipal revenue.

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
