TITLE: "AN ACT CONCERNING DISCHARGE OF PERSONS COMMITTED FOR  
SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A  
COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION ANTI-DRUG GRANT PROGRAM"

FAVORABLY REPORTED BY Judiciary, Appropriations

SUMMARY: This bill would delete language which prohibits the administrator of a substance abuse treatment facility from discharging a person committed under an involuntary commitment. It further deletes language requiring the administrator to seek recommitment of the committed person if such person is likely to become dangerous to himself or others when he is intoxicated.

The bill also establishes the Community Mobilization Anti-Drug Grant Program under CADAC to be run in consultation with the Office of Policy and Management (OPM). Funds, in the amount of \$932,969, are transferred from OPM to CADAC for this purpose in sHB 5100, (the Appropriations Act, as favorably reported from the Appropriations Committee) for fiscal year 1992-93.

EXPLANATION OF ESTIMATES:

Passage of this bill would result in the following:

Section I	Passage of this section is anticipated to result in minimal, if any, fiscal impact. Removing the requirement that CADAC administrators confine a patient who would otherwise be discharged if it cannot be determined with certainty that the patient would not become dangerous to himself or others if intoxicated, is anticipated to affect few, if any, discharges and hence result in minimal, if any, fiscal impact.
