EXPLANATION OF ESTIMATES:

STATE IMPACT: Passage of this bill requires the secretary of the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) to establish uniform policies and procedures for obtaining, managing, and evaluating the quality and cost effectiveness of human services purchased from private providers. For OPM to oversee the State's purchase of service activities, it is anticipated it would require two durational positions for a two year period to initiate these activities. OPM has indicated an annual cost of \$125,000 for these two positions. SHB 5100 (the Appropriations Act, as favorably reported by the Appropriations Committee) does not provide funding for these positions.

On a permanent basis, OPM has indicated it will staff this purchase of service function with existing staff. The Attorney General is required by the bill to develop, with OPM, standards for human service agencies to enter into multi-year contracts with human service providers. It is anticipated that the cost to the Attorney General's Office would be minimal and can be absorbed within existing resources. The monitoring of the State's purchase of service activities is expected to achieve savings that cannot be determined at this time and to increase administrative efficiency.
